Evergreens, banners and flags were festioned and waved over head in all parts of the tent and the centre pole of the tent was concealed by like decorations and dressing. From a common centre radiated four tables, marked respectively A, B, C and D, on the back of the chair of the chairman encircled with evergreen

About 7 o'clock the party which, upon first entering the Park, had been taken in charge by the Park Commissioners, sat down to supper. Beside each plate was a handsome bouquet for the guest.
