Fenian Trials. CANANDAIGUA, June 27 .- In the United States Circuit Court to-day, the Fenian raiders, General Starr and Colonel Thompson, were arraigned upon several indictments against them and pleaded not guilty.

They were indicted jointly and separately for violating the neutrality laws. General Starr appeared with his counsel, who stated to the Court that his client would not be ready for trial at the present term, that he required reasonable time properly to prepare for his defense, and that he had affidavits to sustain his motion to postpone the trial. The Judge said he would hear the motion at 2-30 P. M. Colonel Thompson said that his counsel had not arrived, but that he would be here some time to-morrow.

Captain Mannix was arraigned on Friday, and stated that he could not be prepared for trial until the October circuit at Albany. The two latter cases will probably be disposed of tomorrow, when the motion will be heard. The District Attorney will oppose the motion and press the cases to trial.

The following are the two sections reported by Mr. Sherman and adopted by the Senate as substitutes for the income tax sections stricken out:—

First. That sections 120, 121, 122, and 123 of the act of June 30, 1864, as amended by the acts of July 12, 1866, and March 2, 1867 shall be construed to impose the taxes therein meetioned, being taxes on dividends of corporations and salaries of Government officers for and during the year 1870, and that all such taxes shall be collected in the manner now or hereafter provided by law.

Second. That for the purpose of allowing deductions from incomes, any religious or social community holding all their property and the income therefrom jointly and in common, each five of the persons composing such society, and any remaining fractional number of such persons less than five over such groups of five, shall be held to constitute a family and a reduction of \$1000 shall be allowed for each of soid families. Any taxes on the income, gains, and profits of such societies now due and unpaid shall be assessed and collected according to this provision.

The amendment of the Finance Committee to authorize the consolidation of collection districts was agreed to.

The tariff sections having been reached, the amendments reported from the committee were discussed. That striking out the duty of five cents on chicory, succory, dandelion roo and acorn coffee, raw, ground, burned or prepared, and on all substitutes for coffee, was agreed to.

Mr. Sherman endeavored to withdraw the amendments reducing the duties on sugar according to the Senate committee's classification, so as to allow the rate to remain as under existing laws.
