-The inquest into the recent explosion at Worcester, Mass., has resulted in the censure of the Boston and Albany Railroad Company and the Oriental Powder Company for carelessness.

-In the United States Senate yesterday, after the close of our report, the Tax-tariff bill was taken up and various amendments were adopted. The paragraph reducing the duty on bituminous coal and shale to 59 cents per ton was struck out, leaving the rate as at present. Consideration of the bill was continued in evening session.

In the House the Currency bill was discussed, and the conference report rejectedyeas 53, nays 132-and another conference was ordered. The Senate amendments to the Indian Appropriation bill were reported.

Foreign Affairs. -The Czar has promised to protect Protestants in Lithuania from persecution. -An extensive carpet manufactory in France has been destroyed by fire, entailing a loss of a million dollars, and throwing eight

hundred men cut of employment. -Napoleon, Prim, and Serrano are said to have acquiesced in Isabella's abdication, on condition that no prince of the house of Orleans should succeed to the throne.
