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#### ILLINOIS.

The Constitutional Election To-day-Some of the Fundamental Changes Proposed. To-day an election is being held in Illinois on the question of adopting or rejecting the new

constitution framed by the convention recently in session. Some of the proposed changes in the fundamental law of the land are of more than ordinary importance, as will be seen from the following summary:-

### THE BILL OF RIGHTS.

The Bill of Rights provides, in addition to the pre-sent bill, that no person shall be denied any civil or political rights on account of his religious opinions; that grand juries may be abolished by law, and that no irrevocable grant of special privileges shall be passed by the Legislature.

#### ELIGIBILITY.

No person convicted of bribery, perjury, or other infamous crime is eligible to any office of profit or trust in the State. The present constitution con-tains no provision upon the subject. Members of the Legislature are required to swear that they have not paid any bribe to secure their election, and that they will not take or accept any gift or bribe for any vote or influence they may give or withhold for any official act. The present constitution is silent upon the subject.

#### APPORTIONMENT.

The Legislative and Senatorial districts are to be aportioned according to population, and all coun-ties having three-fifths of a ratio are entitled to at least one representative. Provision is made against gerrymandering. No such provisions in the present Constitution. 1.8

#### APPROPRIATIONS.

No appropriation is permitted in any private law, and bills making appropriations for the pay of any office shall not contain any other provision. There is no provision on this subject in the present Consti-tution. No money can be drawn from the State Treasury except in pursuance of law ; and no money allowed to be diverted when once appropriated. This is to prevent the practice of, the Legislature in making appropriations by law, and then diverting the money to some other object by resolution on which the yeas and nays are not taken.

RELEASE OF DEETS DUE THE STATE. The Legislature shall not release or extingaish the indebtedness, liability, or obligation of any corpora-tion or individual to the State, or to any municipal corporation therein. This is a new provision, in-tended to provide against an existing abuse. EXTRA COMPENSATION.

The Legislature is forbidden to grant or authorize extra compensation, fee, or allowance to any public officer, agent, or contractor, after service has been rendered on a contract made. There is no existing provision on the subject.

# LOANING STATE CREDET.

The State shall not loan its credit, nor in any manner become responsible for the debts or liabili-ties of corporations or individuals. No such provi-sion in the present Constitution. EXTENDING TERM OF OFFICE.

No law shall be passed extending the term of any public officer after his election or appointment. No similiar existing provision.

MINORITY REPRESENTATION.

The State is divided into Senatorial Districts, with a provision that each District elect one Senator and three Representatives. Each voter is to be entitled to as many votes as there are Representatives to be chosen; and he may divide his votes among candi-dates as he may see fit; that is, he may cast the the three ballots for one person, or may divide his votes among the several candidates. This provision is new, and is to be submitted separately.

SPECIAL LEGISLATION PROHIBITED.

Twenty-three classes of subjects are enumerated upon which the General Assembly may not legis-late, and to still further abridge special legislation it is provided that no special law shall be enacted in cases where a general law can apply.

-Some of the above provisions are of the most desirable character, and it would be well if the people of this State could have an oppor-tanity for voting upon similar propositions, especially those affecting legislation. Altogether, the proposed new constitution appears to be an admirable one; and, judging from the voice of the press, which seems, without dis-tinction of party, to be almost unanimous in its favor, it is reasonably certain that it will be adopted.

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

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


