INFALLIBILITY.

Council. It will probably be some time before ve can arrive at the exact terms of the dogma as finally approved by the Council, but below we give its terms as received by mail in this ountry several weeks ago. The following is hearticle defining the doctrine, as made public in March last:-

Chapter to be added to the decree upon the Primacy of the Roman Pontiff, to the effect hat the Roman Pontiff cannot err in the definiion of matters of faith or morals. The Holy Roman Church possesses the au-

preme and complete primacy and principality over the Universal Catholic Church, which it verily and humbly acknowledges to have re-ceived with the plentitude of the pewer of the Lord himself, in the person of St. Peter, the Prince of Apostles, of whom the Roman Pontiff is the successor the successor.

And as, above all things, it behooves it to nake clear the truth of the faith, all questions hich may arise upon matters of faith must be stermined by its judgment, seeing that other-ise the words of the Lord Jesus Christ (Tu es Petrus, etc.) would be disregarded.

That which has been set forth upon this point as been proved by the results as in the Apos-plic See, the Catholic religion has always been reserved immaculate, and its doctrine has ways been maintained at its fullest (celebrata). Consequently, we inculcate, with the concur-nce of the Holy Council, and we define as a gma of faith, that, thanks to the Divine astance, it is that the Roman Pontiff, of whom was said in the person of St. Peter by our same rd Jesus Christ, "I have prayed for thee," c., cannot err when, acting in his quality as preme teacher of all Christians, he defines hat the Universal Church must hold in matters f faith and morals, and that the prerogative of terrancy or infallibility extends over the same natters to which the infallibility of the Church applicable. But if any one should dareent definition, let him know that he departs rom the truth of the faith.

The following is the text of the Echema of afallibility, in five canons:-

I. If any one should say that the episcopal hair of the Roman Church is not the true and al infallible chair of Blessed Peter, or that it s not been divinely chosen by God as the ost solid, indefectible, and incorruptible rock the whole Christian Church, let him be ana-

II. If any one should say that there exists in world another infallible chair of the truth the Gospel of Christ our Lord, distinct and arate from the chair of the Blessed Peter, let be anathema.

I. If any one should deny that the divine risterium of the chair of Blessed Peter is essary to the true way of eternal salvation all men, whether unfaithful or faithful, ather laymen or bishops, let him be anathema. IV. If any one should say that each Roman ntiff, legitimately elected, is not by Divine the the successor of Blessed Peter, even in glft of infallibility of magisterium, and ld deny to any one of them the prerogative infallibility for teaching the Church the Word God pure from all corruption and error, let m be anathema.

V. If any one should say that general coun-s are established by God in the Church as a wer of feeding the Divine flock in the word faith superior to the Roman Pontiff, or equal him, or necessary by Divine institution in der that the magisterium of the Roman shop should be preserved infallible, let him be athema.




