NEW YORK, Aug. 24, 1870. The New Hotel.

Of course you have heard of our new hotel. You know that its name is the Grand Central, that its value, including the cost of the ground, the furniture, and the building of it, is two million dollars, that it is ten stories high, and will accommodate fifteen hundred people. It was opened to-day, and the scale of terms has been fixed at three, three-and-a-half, and four dollars per day. Upon such occasions as the opening of a big house like this, venerable newspaper custom requires that the local department of the respective metropolitan journals should blossom with congratulations. Setting compliments aside, however, I have but little doubt that the new hotel is very well worth the patronage which it will receive, and which it has begun to receive already. Its influence has already been felt by the proprietors of other hotels. The dally charge at the Metropolitan Hotel, for instance, was, some weeks ago, put down to four dollars. A corresponding deduction went into effect at the Astor House last Monday week. There is going to be a superb inaugural dinner to-morrow night. Of course we all know what these inaugural dinners mean. Every newspaper man who gets an invitation is expected to pay therefor by more than paragraphic puffery. So far as I know and believe, however, the Grand Central deserves most of the good things that will protably be said of it. If size is a claim to merit, its claim is less disputable than that of any other hotel in New York. It is built of four million bricks, has about twenty thousand gallons of water in tanks, contains five thousand chairs, and nearly seven hundred rooms. It is carpeted with seven acres of carpet, and mirrors, lace, and damask are "slung around" with an extravagant audacity that causes the country cousin to breathe hard.

The Theatres.

The improvements which Mr. Daly has made and is making at the Fifth Avenue Theatre will render it as perfect in its way as Booth's Theatre is in its. All the United States knows by this time that Daly's little theatre is a pocket edition of the dramatic temple. It will hold scarcely a thousand people, but the lessee and manager is determined that these thousand shall be provided with as many means of luxury as the patrons of any other theatre in the city are. His company will consist of Agnes Ethel, Fanny Davenport, Fanny Morant, Mrs. Gilbert, Kate Newton, Ione Burke, and Messrs. Harkins, Polk, Davidge, Parkes, Bascomb (formerly of the old Walnut Street Theatre, Philadelphia), and Holland, Mr. Holland may be termed Honorary member, for he will probably not make one appearance during the entire season, and the mere fact of nis engagement speaks very well for Mr. Daly's goodness of heart. The season will open with Man and Wife, and progress with the reproduction of Frou-Frou and Fernande, and the introduction of adaptations of La Princesse George, L'Amour sur la Branche, Les Cris de Cotin, and Fricoche and Cacolet. The last one is by Victorien Sardou. One of Moliere's last comedies is also to be revived. Oakey Hall and Mr. Daly have likewise been working together on Sheridan's fragment entitled Affectation, and have raised upon it a superstructure in which Newport and the yachting season are made to gure. One very singular addition has been made to the orchestra. It consists of a very handsome water-hydrant, which appears beside the conductor's seat in full sight of the audience, and in case of fire, is calculated to give the public assurance of safety. Six large Parisian private boxes have been built at the extreme rear of the orchestra-another new and very agreeable feature, and one that will commend itself, in the

Driven to Do It. "Sad Cose of Suicide" is the favorite headoing of local paragraphs which describe the crime of taking one's life. Was there ever a case of suicide that was not sad? I wender. There are degrees of sadness, of course, and one of the most mournful I ever heard of came under my notice to cay. It has relation to a man named George Au, who, with a wife and four children, lived on the third floor of a tenement house in Ludlow street. About eighteen months ago Au suddenly became aware of the fact that he was a consumptive. The discovery preved so upon his mind that he took to drink. and from being sober and industrious he became dissipated and idle. This sad change, of course, still further injured his health. So wide and deep grew the ruin that in time he became incapable of work, and had to be supported by his wife. Of course the poor woman had to work very hard, and the fact that she was obliged to do so weighed still more heavily upon Au's mind. He began to talk about suicide. but his wandering remarks were regarded merely as the meaningless threats of a morbid and unstrung mind. Late in the afternoon of Tuesday, however, he went up stairs to their common room, called his wife and children around him, and, shaking each by the hand, deliberately bade them farewell. How his wife, knowing that he had often threatened suicide, could have permitted him to proceed so far without calling for help, I cannot explain. It is one of the inexplicable things that any one would say could not happen, but which constantly do happen. His farewells spoken, he proceeded, in full view of his wife and children, to a cupboard at one side of the room, and took from one of the shelves a loaded pistol. At this point, indeed, his wife ran to the door and shricked for assistance. The effort was too late. Before her screams reached those they had been meant to summon, the fatal shot had been fired, and her husband fell heavily back into the cupboard, a corpse. Anything so full of calm despair on his part and criminal irresoluteness on hers, I have not heard of for many a day.
