A Fight Near Montmedy. There was a fight yesterday near Montmedy between the advanced cavalry detachments of the French and the Prussian armies. The latter were repulsed. Large reinforcements have been sent from Paris by the Northern Railway for MacMahon's army. Mac Hahon's Tactics.

The tactics of MacMahon appear to be to gather up the broken corps, and thereby swell the ranks of his new levies, and then sweep along the borders of Belgium, avoiding an encounter with the Prussians that would be likely to involve a pitched battle. What the Movement Will Accomplish.

By this movement he will be enabled to leave the Prussians on the south, and will probably effect a junction with Bazaine north of Metz. If successful in this MacMahon will, it is thought, strike the Prussian line of communication at St. Arnold. This is believed tobe the strategy which Count Palikao hinted at some few days ago in his communication to the Corps Legislatif.

French Losses at Rezonville.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—The official report of Bagaine shows the French loss at the battle of Rezonville to be 23,000 men. French Insult to a Flag of Truce.

BERLIN, Aug. 27, via London, Aug. 27 .- A note has been addressed from Berlin to all envoys of Prussia in regard to a flag of truce sent into the French lines, asking a cessation of hostilities to bury the dead, which truce was refused and the flag insulted on three different occasions. Prussin Will Not Treat Until the Empire is

Ended. Prussia, therefore, declares its resolution to offer no diplomatic negotiations to the French people until the empire is declared at an end. Ratification of the Belgian Treaty. LONDON, Aug. 27 .- The representatives of

France, England, and Prussia have signed the ratification of the Belgian treaty. The Prussian Reserves. Times this morning says, in a review of of the resources of Prussia, that three armies of reserves have been formed to await events in France, one on the Rhine, under the Duke of Mecklenburg Schwerin, one at Berlin, under General Can-

stain, and one at Silesia, under General Tor-

renberg. The Defenses of Paris. Special to N. Y. Telegram Paris, Aug. 27 .- Preparations for the defense of Paris are still being made. The authorities have determined that every man in the city shall contribute towards or take an active part

in the defense. Two thousand vagrants, having no ostensible means of support, and of the class likely to disturb the peace of the city, were arrested yesterday. These men will either be put to work upon the fortifications or expelled from the city.

FROM WASHINGTON.

Internal Revenue Storekeepers. Special Despatch to The Evening Telegraph. Washington, Aug. 27.—Under the recent law of Congress for the compensation of Internal revenue storekeepers, the failure on the part of the proprietor of a bonded warehouse to reimburse the Government for the salary of storekeepers renders the property liable to seizure and distrainment for the recovery of the amount due.
