FROM EUROPE. Rioting in Berlin.—Bismarck's House Attacked. PARIS, Aug. 27.—A serious riot occurred in Berlin, during which Bismarck's house was attacked. The Hotel Meyerbeer, in this city, kept by Germans, was also attacked last night, and only saved from total destruction by the interference of the police.

MacMahon's Northern Movement. LONDON, Aug. 27.—The reported northern movement of MacMahon is now fully confirmed. A Fight Near Montmedy. Between the advanced cavalry detachments of the French and the Prussian armies. The latter were repulsed. Large reinforcements have been sent from Paris by the Northern Railway for MacMahon's army.

French Losses at Rezonville. LONDON, Aug. 27.—The official report of Bazaine shows the French loss at the battle of Rezonville to be 23,000 men. French Insult to a Flag of Truce. BERLIN, Aug. 27, via London, Aug. 27.—A note has been addressed from Berlin to all envoys of Prussia in regard to a flag of truce sent into the French lines, asking a cessation of hostilities to bury the dead, which truce was refused and the flag insulted on three different occasions.

Prussia Will Not Treat Until the Empire is Restored. Prussia, therefore, declares its resolution to offer no diplomatic negotiations to the French people until the empire is declared at an end. Ratification of the Belgian Treaty. LONDON, Aug. 27.—The representatives of France, England, and Prussia have signed the ratification of the Belgian treaty. The Prussian Reserves. The Times this morning says, in a review of the resources of Prussia, that three armies of reserves have been formed to await events in France, one on the Rhine, under the Duke of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, one at Berlin, under General Canstain, and one at Silesia, under General Torrenberg.

FROM WASHINGTON. Internal Revenue Storekeepers. Special Dispatch to The Evening Telegraph. WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Under the recent law of Congress for the compensation of internal revenue storekeepers, the failure on the part of the proprietor of a bonded warehouse to reimburse the Government for the salary of storekeepers renders the property liable to seizure and distraintment for the recovery of the amount due.

The route of the Northern Pacific Railroad has been recognized by the Secretary of the Interior from the eastern terminus at the mouth of the Montreal river, on Lake Superior, to Seattle, on Puget's Sound, and maps are in course of preparation showing the line of the road and the limit of the land grant of ten miles on each side of it.

FROM EUROPE. The garde Mobile. PARIS, Aug. 27.—A correspondent of the London Daily News, writing from this city, says:—"The French Garde Mobile is formed of children, and but few of the members are over eighteen years of age." This is untrue. Every member is from twenty to twenty-five years of age.

Execution of Spies. This morning several more Prussian spies, condemned by the Council of War, were executed. Excitement in Paris. The approach of the Prussians on Paris creates the most intense excitement. Despatches received from various provinces announce a sudden and immense increase in volunteering to defend the capital.

Provisions Falling at Metz. LONDON, Aug. 27.—Metz is gorged with wounded, and the provisions of the beleaguered city are falling. The imprisonment of Madame Tascher de la Pagerie, reported yesterday, is not true. She is at the seaside in Brittany. The Prince Imperial is at Rithel, 35 miles from Metz.

French Newspaper Opinions. PARIS, Aug. 27.—The Journal des Debats today has an editorial article on the situation of which the following is an extract:—"We have faith that all will do their duty in the hour of peril. The attitude of the Senate and Corps Legislatif proves that before the enemy there will be no parties. Deputy Koranyi himself has moved a political truce, and public sentiment will judge all who try to break it. There must be but one thought, one interest—to repulse the enemy."

The Prussian Advance. The Prussians say half of the journey to Paris has been accomplished, and all obstructions are now left behind. Behind Time. Reuter's telegrams from France, printed in London papers to-day, are dated on Tuesday last. The International telegraphic service is badly disorganized.
