THE COAL TRADE. The State of the Market-The Situation in Schuylkill-The Lehigh Region-Quotations,

Etc.

The trade at this port is better this week than last. There is considerable inquiry for all sizes, and for some the demand is greater than the supply. These sizes are those most in use by private consumers, who are now commencing to lay in for the winter's supply. There has been no change yet in prices.

The retail dealers also are now anxious to lay in stock, and besides this there is said to be an improvement in the line trade. These two facts help materially to give the firm tone to the market.

Coastwise freights tend to higher prices. During the early part of the week there was an abundance of vessels, but in the latter part they were scarce and much sought after.

The Schuyikill region has quieted down, and we hear no more of a contemplated strike, and probably will not until the next sward of wages is made, when, if the prices are again lower than the three dollars, further dissatisfaction may be expected. The letter of the President of the W. B. A. to his men takes a remarkably sensible view of the situation.

letter of the President of the W. B. A. to his men takes a remarkably sensible view of the situation. He advises them that the last award was made in a just manner, and that there is no cause for dissatisfaction, they having agreed to be bound by the scale whichever way it worked. He states, however, that this is the first time that it has worked to the disadvantage of the miners—that is, gone below \$3. It was evidently generally thought, when the agreement was signed, that the rates would not fall.

The following extract from the letter, though not very grammatical, will show the spirit of the document. It would have been well if the author had spoken thus before he was driven to it by the failure of the strike:—

Knowing that it is the aim and intention of the soulless corporations of Luzerne county to again drive us into
a strike and have full possession of the markets as they
have had heretofore by our foolish and unwise actions,
cause me to enter my protost against you entering into a
strike, knowing full well that if you do, the result will be
tenfold more disasterous than anything you have heretofore done. If I saw any complaint, or that our employers
were trying to take any undue advantages of us, there
would none be more ready to make it known or resist it
than I. Should you enter into a strike at the present
time, all reason would be against you, public opinion
would denounce you, and you would be looked upon as untrustworthy, for breaking your contract when agreed upon
by your committee; besides, it would bring disunion
among you, and most undoubtedly the result would be the
dismemberment of your association."
