LOST AT SEA.

The Foundering of the Alexander Petion – Her Remarkable History. The foundering of the steamer Alexander Petion 100 miles northeast of the island of Abaco, an Island of the Bahama group, has given rise to the follow-ing interesting history of the vessel's encore. The Alexander Petion was a very fine so w propeller, and was one of four built for the Seatthern trads. At the breaking out of the war she was purchased by the United States Government and named the Galatea. She was employed for some during the war as convoy to the Pacific mail steamers, and saw a great deal of service, Cape Haytien being her coaling station. Her armament consisted of 18 guns, one of which was a 100-pounder. In 1965 she was sold to Geffrard, ex-President of Hayti, by whom she was used as a man-of-war, her name being changed to Alexander Petion. When Geffrard was deposed by Salnawe she passed into the hands of the new gov-ernment, by whom she was sent to New York for Sainage she passed into the bands of the new gov-ernment, by whom she was sent to New York for repairs. On the voyage up she became disabled, and was taken in tow by an American steamer and taken into a Southern port; the salvage claimed upon her was \$30,000. She was then brought to New York and laid in the dock at Pier No. 45 East River for several months, and her repairs cost \$155,000. She left New York under the Haytien flag, the rebellion in Hayti meanwhile breaking out, and soon aft r encountered two revolutionary steamers, the Twenty-second of December and Liberte, and with the American flag flying, sunk both at Petic Goave. She was, at that time, under command of Captain Nicholls, who had seen service in the Ameri-can navy. After his encounter with the two revo-lutionary steamers, she bombar ded several towns in can navy. After his encounter with the two revo-lutionary steamers, she bombarded several towns in Southern Hayti, during which she was somewhat crippled. She subsequently got into an engage-ment with the Quaker City and Fiorida, of Cape Haytien, in September, 1859, and was so disabled as to be compelled to run under shelter of the port. When the fort was captured by the insurgents under Saget, the Alexander Fetion was rescued also. She afterward did good service under Saget's Govera-ment, and was at the taking of Port-au-Prince, which port she was the first to enter with troops She was subsequently sold by the Government to A. Ravere for \$5500, gold.


