City Affairs. Last evening a meeting of citizens in favor of Penn Square as the site for the proposed new public buildings was held on Filbert street, below Sixteenth. The meeting was organized by the selection of Alderman Jones, chairman. Mr. T. W. Braidwood moved that the chair appoint a committee of eight to distribute tickets in favor of Penn Square on the day of election.
