A DEATH EXHIBITION.

Scene in a Hospital-A "Fine Operation," but the Patient Dies. The Cincinnati Inquirer of the 19th instant has

the following:
— Some excitement was caused yesterday forenoon in medical circles by the announcement that a patient had died from chioroform at the Choinnati Hospital, while under the knife of the amputator. An inquiry into the circumstances elicited the fol-lowing facts:—The deceased was named Bridget Henry, and had been an inmate of the hospital about four months. Four or five months previous to that time she had been troubled with a cancer upon the instep, which, increasing rapidly in size, finally made removal to the hospital and treatment there a

made removal to the hospital and treatment there a necessity.

After admission, the usual remedies were used, without checking the growth of the cancer, which was of the kind known among medical men as Fungue Haepotides. As it enlarged, ligatures were applied, but it still continued to develop. Hypodermic injections were resorted to, and chloral opiates were freely used. The patient was, in spite of all that could be done for her relief, rapidly losing strength, and after consultation, an operation was decided upon.

It was agreed that this should be done by Syme's process, removing the entire foot with the exception

process, removing the entire foot with the exception of the heel. Dr. Dawson performed the operation, assisted by several of the resident physicians, one of whom administered the chloroform. It is said that only seventy-five minims (about two and a half tea-spoonsful) were given, a large portion of which must spoonsful) were given, a large portion of which must have escaped into the air by evaporation. The bone had been sawed, the flap turned, and the limb was just ready to be sewed up, when it was observed that the woman had ceased to breathe.
