The Maid of Artois was succeeded by Katherine Grey, Sir John Falstaff, Les Quatre Fils d'Aymon, Keolanthe, Joan of Arc, and Les Nuits d'Amour. Not being successful as the lessee of the English Opera House, he engaged as musical composer for Drury Lane, and during the lesseeship of Alfred Bunn produced The Bohemian Girl for Mr. Harrison and Miss Rainforth, also The Daughter of St. Mark, The Enchantress, L'Etoile de Seville, and The Bondman, and subsequently The Maid of Honor, The Rose of Castile, which may be ranked with The Bohemian Girl, land Satanella, which completes the trip of Balfe's most popular works, were both written for Miss Louisa Pyne and Mr. Harrison. The number of his melodies is almost incredible, ranging from "The Light of Other Days" to that of "Come into the Garden, Maud," all attractive if not intricate, and calculated to strike the popular ear, if not to rivet the attention of the thorough musician. As a composer, Balfe is said to have equalled Bellini and Auber in the spontaneity of his melodies, and, although he has left nothing which deserves to be ranked with the works of the great masters, he has left much which will long maintain its hold upon the popular fancy.
