#### BUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

Madome Scebach as "Jane Eyre." Madame Seebach's personation of "Jane Eyre last evening at the Academy of Music was perhaps as perfect a presentation of the character as it would be possible to make upon the stage, and that it fell short of the wonderful force of the original is due to the fact that there is much in the "Jane Eyre" of the novel that is not susceptible of dramatic treatment, and also to the limitations imposed by a singularly feeble dramatization of one of the most powerful novels in the English language. Of the intensely dramatic scenes that every reader of the novel would expect a playwriter to eagerly seize upon, not one has been reproduced by Madame Birch Pfeiffer, the author of the drama of Jane Eyre, and in all our experience of indifferent stage adaptations of novels we have seldom seen a more weak and worthless travesty of a great work of art than the one which Madame Seebach vainly endeavored to illuminate by her geniss last evening. The most successful portion of Madame Seebach's performance, so far as its effect apon the audience was concerned, was in the prologue, where she appeared as the neglected and despised orphan in the hoase of "Mistress Reed," but there were finer touches in the subsequent scenes, and the drama rather than the actress was to blame if the audience did not realize the full force of the situation where "Jane Evre" and "Rochester" are brought together in the house of the latter. Madame Scebach's performance last evening proved even more conclusively than that of Monday that she is an actress of remarkable talents, and we were gratified to see a much larger andlence in attendance than on her opening night.






