MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

Madame Seebach as "Adrience Lecouvrour." Scribe's play of Adrienne Lecouvreur, which was performed last evening at the Academy of Music, possesses many advantages over either of the pieces in which Madame Seebach had previously appeared. It is not a rehash of comebody else's ideas, like the adaptation of Jane Eyre, and it is not a poem like Mary Stuart, but it is an acting play, written expressly with a view to stage representation, and in its characters, its plot, and its striking situations the most accomplished French dramatist of the day has shown his knowledge of the requirements of stage effect in an unmistakable manner. Adrienne Lecouvreur has much of the breadth of melodrama, and while it scarcely rises to the dignity of a legitimate tragedy, it is distinguished by a delicacy of treatment that approaches the higher forms of art, and the title role especially, with its varying emotions, is one that is admirably suited for the exhibition of the powers of such an artist as Madame Seebach. The personation of "Adrienne" by this actress last night was in every respect a rarely beautiful performance, and the tenderness and grace of the interview between "Adrienne" and "Maurice" in the green-room were only surpassed by the tragic intensity of the scene where the actress, in her recitation of a passage from Phadre, hurls definance at her rival, and in the sad but beautiful ending of the play, where "Adrienne," dying from the effects of the poisoned flowers that have been sent her by the "Princess," finds her lover at her feet, and expires happy in the knowledge that he has been true to her from first to last. Madame Seebach was admirably supported by her company, the performances of Mad'ile

Veneta as the "Princess" and Mr. Dombrowski as "Maurice" in particular being up to a very high standard of excellence.
