Onondaga Penitentiany, Nov. 11, 1870.— Dear Mother:—I have had good news this morning. Mother, I am going to State Prison for ife! Oh! sin't I glad of this! I know it is a nife! Oh! ain't I glad of this! I know it is a hardword to say—I'm glad to go to State Prison for life. But think of the gallows two weeks from to-day! Oh! mother, God has done this for me; I asked Him to spare me another year, and He has! Mother, when you get in trouble ask God to help you and He will, as He did me. Oh! how can I thank Him for that! "His loving kindness, oh, how good!" Mother, when I am in State Prison you will come sometimes to see me—won't you, mother? Mother, don't forget God. Thank Him for what He has done for me. I shall not forget Him. He is my friend forever—in this world and the next. Mother, God has saved your son from the gallows! I God has saved your son from the gallows! I may never see you again after I leave this place. If not, we may meet in heaven. Jesus said he would go up and prepare a place for us, and then he would come for us. You will flud it in the fourteenth chapter of St. John, the third verse. Mother, I want you all to seek for it now—so he can have it ready. I had rather be here as I now feel than to be out and have at my sins upon me, as they were when I came home last spring. Mother, Jesus says, *Come and follow me, and I will save you." I look up and say, "Blessed Jesus." Then he smiles on me. Oh, mother, you don't know how happy I It isn't because I am going to the State Prison, it is because God is with me, and Jesus, my dear Saviour! Good-by, my dear mother. Your affectionate son,

GEORGE D. CARY. On the next day Cary wrote the following let-ter to the citizens of SyracuseONONDAGA COUNTY PENITENTIABY, Nov. 12,

1870 .- To the Citizens of Syracuse: - I thank you a thousand times for the kindness you have done for me, and saved me from the gal-lows. You have given me time to repent before my God of all the sins I ever done. I was a poor, drunken, penniless murderer before my God, and now I have time to repent, and I will make good use of it. I will not idle my time away in sinful thought, and when I go to State Prison, there I will try to serve the rules of the prison and my God, until he calls me away, and then I hope I will be ready to meet him and all of my kind friends that have saved me from that dreadful fate that was before me and close at hand. I will think of what you have done for me on the 25th of this month. When that hour comes, then I can say to-day would have been my last day on earth if it had not been for them kind hearts that felt for me and saved me from it. Oh! how can I thank you all for that kind favor you all done me, and you have saved me from the gallows and from that ever-
