THE LATEST NEWS. THE WAR IN FRANCE. The Condition of Paris. The New Spanish King. FROM EUROPE. QUEENSTOWN, Nov. 26.—The steamships Nebraska and Java, from New York for Liverpool, have arrived at this port.

THE NEW KING OF SPAIN. FLORENCE, Nov. 26.—A volunteer deputation of nobles will leave this city to-day to meet the Spanish deputation at Genoa on Monday.

Disseminated on Fortnight. King Victor Emanuel has already received the congratulations of the Austrian and Prussian Governments on the election of Aosta.

The soldiers of the Class of 1843 are to be dismissed on furlough on the first of next month. Sharp shocks of earthquake recently occurred in Romagna.

Condition of Paris. LONDON, Nov. 26.—A telegram, varying from all other authorities, has just been given to the public here, announcing that Paris is still confident, and there is subsistence in the city for two months and a half, bread for eight months, and wine and brandy for a year.

FROM THE WEST. Fire in Chicago. CHICAGO, Nov. 26.—At about 11 o'clock last night McClellan & Stearns' planing-mill, on Quarry street, near Arch avenue, took fire, and was completely destroyed.

Shortly after the above fire was under way, another broke out in the basement of a four-story brick building, No. 17 Clinton street, owned by Stewart & Sea.

The rumored Resignation of Senator Drake. St. Louis, Nov. 26.—The Republican has despatches from Jefferson City, which say nothing is known there of the reported resignation of Senator Drake, and that the rumors that Governor McClurg will call an extra session of the Legislature are unfounded.

The St. Louis Hotel Fire. It is stated that a gentleman whose name was withheld had thirty thousand dollars in greenbacks and other papers in a safe in the building which was burned yesterday, and as the safe door was open during the fire it is believed all is lost.

Butchers Captured. John Armstrong and Charles Jolly, the butchers of the Lapine family, near Pottsville, a few days ago, were captured on Wednesday, and are now in jail at Pottsville.

Murderer Arrested. B. F. Mackey, charged with having committed a murder near Frankfort, Ky., last March, was arrested here yesterday, and will be held until a requisition from Governor Stevenson arrives.

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
