#### MENTS SUMMARY.

#### City Affairs.

-A number of prominent business men as-sembled in parlor C of the Continental Hetel last evening for the purpose of taking initiatory steps towards the erection of statues to Samuel V. Merrick and Mathias W. Baldwin. D. S. Brown presided and Israel W. Morris acted as Secretary. A series of resolutions providing for the appointment of a committee to walt upon cur citizens to subscribe for the object were adopted. The subscription money, it was provided in the resolutions, is not to be paid until signatures for the sum of \$30,000 are obtained. Subscriptions were then made in aid of the object of the meeting, as follows: -M. Baird & Co., \$1000; Jesse W. Starr & Sons, of Camden, \$500; David S. Brown, \$250; Frederick Fraley, \$100; John O. James, \$100.

-Last evening, about haif-past seven o'clock. Frank Rone, 45 years of age, was run over by car No. 12 of the Lombard and South Streets, Passenger Rallway, at Front and Dock streets, injuring him severely. He was removed to the hospital. The conductor and driver were arrested.

-A meeting of the Public Buildings Commission was held yesterday to consider the request of Councils for information as to tueir action thus far. An answer was directed to be sent to the effect that no plan has been adopted nor any esilmate of expenses made, and as to the intention to build over the intersection of Broad and Market streets, they communicate their opinion endorsed by Messrs. Meredith, Mann, and Brewster, who have been retained as additional counsel to answer the injunction filed. A resolution was adopted directing all proposals to be opened only at a meeting of the Board.

-The sixteenth annual anniversary of the Young Men's Christian Association was cele-brated last night at the Academy of Music. #### Attempted Marder and Saielde.

In a late edition of THE EVENING TELE-GRAPH yesterday reference was made to the attempted murder of Mrs. Kate Wolf and the suicide of Charles Wolf, her brother-in-law, The facts of the affair are as follows:--

Charles Wolf, who was 36 years of age, and a gas fitter by trade, resided in his brother's house, No. 1203 Wood street. He was on bad terms with his brother's wife, and quarrelled on one occasion, after which his brother requested him to keep out of the rooms occupied by him. The deceased was in the house all day vesterday, and about 2 o'clock in the afternoon he went into Mrs. Wolf's room in the second story where she was sitting, with an infaut child play-ing upon the floor. The deceased, without speaking, pointed a pistol at her as if about to shoot. Mrs. Wolf sprang to her feet and caught her brother-in-law by the arm, and in the scufile that ensued the pistol was discharged, the ball missing Mrs. Wolf, but passing through the arm of the child and grazing its side, inflicting a painful but not a dangerous wound. Mrs. Wolf then caught up the child and ran down stairs. In a few moments she heard another shot fired, and on going upstairs Charles was found dead upon the foor of the bath-room. The ball had entered the right temple and came out behind the car. The Coroner held an inquest, and a verdict of "Death from suicide" was rendered.

One appropriating \$9387 for the expenses of the special election in the First Senatorial district in December next; one appropriating \$82,500 for the Park Commission; one appropriating \$33,800 to the Trustees of the City Ice Boat; \$2000 for the defense of the city, and one appropriating \$840,308'56 for police expenses to the department of police for next year. Postponed for the present.

Also, an ordinance making a transfer of appropriation to the Board of Public Education, for the repairs of the Newton schoolhouse.

The ordinance appropriating \$9387 for election expenses in the First Senatorial district was taken up, considered, and passed. Mr. Willits, from the Committee on Sarveys, reported favorably on the construction of certain sewers in West Philadelphia, and the bill was passed.

Mr, Miller, from the Committee on Election Divisions, reported an ordinance rearranging the divisions in the Seventh ward, and adding one thereto. Passed.

Also, a resolution changing the place of voting in the Fourth division of the Eighth ward to the corner of Tenth and Locust streets. Also, a resolution changing the place of voting in the Fifth division of the Twenty-sixth ward to Eighteenth and Carpenter streets. Agreed to.

After the consideration of several minor bills from Select Council, the chamber adjourned.

### COMMON COUNCIL.

The Paid Fire Department Bill Passed. A special meeting of Common Council was held yesterday afternoon, to resume consideration of the bill creating a paid fire department and other business.

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer and City Surveyor, asking for an appropriation of \$55,000 to construct a bridge over the Reading Railroad at Fifth stree . Referred. Mr. Allison presented an ordinance to organize

a House of Correction and Employment for the city. Postponed for the present. Mr. Hetzell appealed from the decision of the chair, to the effect that the Chamber had to re-

solve itself immediately into Committee of the Whole by reason of the adjournment to consider the Paid Department bill. The yeas and nays being called, the Chair was sustained-28 yeas to 7 navs.

The Chamber then resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole, Mr. Miller, from the Nineteenth ward, in the chair.

An amendment to the effect that no Commis sioner of the Fire Department shall hold any Federal, State, or municipal office during nis term as commissioner was urged by Mr Hetzell.

Messre. Kline and Hanna opposed it.

The amendment was agreed to. The eleventh section of the bill, defining the duties of the Chief and Assistant Engineers, was next read, and adopted as read. The thirteenth section prescribes the number

of hosemen, firemen, and other officers of each engine company.

Mr. Hetzell offered an amendment, to create the office of foreman, who shall control the affairs of the company, and be permanently employed.

The amendment was not agreed to, and the section was adopted as read. The seventeenth section of the bill prescribes

that the commissioners, chief and assistant engineers, and foremen of companies shall exer-

cise power as police officers in going to, at, and returning from a fire. Mr. Allen moved to amend by striking out "in

going to and returning from." It was argued that there would likely be a conflict of authority between these officers and

the regular police. Mr. Buzby said that the clause was a very important one of the bill, as it would materially aid in the prevention of disorder at a fire.

It was moved by Mr. Stockdale to strike out the entire section, which was not agreed to. Mr. Allen withdrew his amendment, and the

section was adopted.

The twenty-second section, which appropri-ates \$400,000 to the Fire Commissioners to lease and purchase apparatus, was stricken out, and an amendment of Mr. Hanna's adopted, authorizing the Commissioners to lease apparatus for not exceeding three years.

The appropriation necessary will be made by special ordinance.

The provisions of the bill having been duly considered, the committee rose and reported the bill to the Chamber.

Before it was put on its passage Mr. Hetzell moved to amend the first section by creating five instead of seven commissioners. Not agreed to -10 ayes, 35 navs. The bill was then read the second and third

The ordinance fixing the tax rate at \$1.80 for 1871 came up next in order, but on motion it was postponed and made the special order for Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Mr. Miller, from the Committee on Highways, reported, among other ordinances, one

including nine guns. The Duke of Mecklenburg was folled in an attempt to occupy Le Mans, which was covered by a corps of 50,000 men, composed of Fierck's and Keratry's troops, commanded by

Fierck. The main body of D'Aurelles' army still occupies an intrenched position between Orleans and Ar he-hay. The Germans attempted to encircle him by pressing forward one force, commanded by Prince Frederick Charles, to Gien, and another to Biols, commanded by the Duke of Mecklenburg, while the centre, directly in front of Arthenay, was com-manded by Von der Tann. The Government here has every assurance that D'Aurelles' strategy is ad-mirable, and that at the proper moment he will assume the offensive, pierce Von der Tann's line, and push forward towards Versailles, leaving a suf-ficient force on both wings to occupy the attention of Frederick Charles and Mecklenburg. Yesterday the right wing of the army of the Loire, having repulsed during the previous pressing forward one force, commanded by Princ

Loire, having repulsed during the previous day several at empts of the enemy to turn its fank, advanced to Gien and Montarges, and thence commenced a movement towards Pithiviers, in combi-nation with the advance of the right centre of the army at Arthemay to the same point. While these mevements were being made detachments of the enemy were in every case driven towards Beaume midway between Montarges and Pitniviers. Here at 2 P. M.were massed 40,600 men. The French assailed the Prussian positions from the south, capturing two guns. At night all the Germans seemed to be retreating further north. The German losses dur-

ing November 27 and 28 were very heavy. The Gazette de France reports that General La-ronzen successfully engaged the Germans near

Tours, Nov. 29.-(Special to the New York Tribraze. – Keratry has given in his resignation in face of the enemy, and threatens Gambetta with a coun-cil of war. He also accuses General Loverda of treason. Keratry is at Tours. VERSAILLES, NOV. 29.—The French yesterday at-

tacked the Germans at Beaume, between Montargis

and Pithevers, and were repulsed. Frederick Charles was present and directed the operations. A thousand prisoners fell into our hands. An official despatch from General Werder con-firms the reported defeat of Garibaidi at Pasgnes on Saturday last, and their disorderly dight. Werder followed up his success on the next day by turn ing the position to which the French had retreated failing on their rear, and inflicting a loss of 400 killed. The French retreated in four directions.

The Prussians loss was fifty killed. VERSAILLES, Nov. 29.—(Special to New York Tri-bune.)—A demonstration was made by the French last night against Bezous from Mont Valerien, and another against Montrouge this morning from the same place. There was also a serious attack upon the Prussian corps stationed at Choisy, at 9 o'clock this morning, but the assaulting columns were re-pulsed, with many killed and 250 prisoners taken. The German loss is small. The Bavarian corps were also engaged. A heavy fire was kept up by the French from Ville Juif. LONDON, Nov. 29-(Special to the New York

World.)- At a Cabinet council yesterday a despatch was received from Odo Russell, containing Bis-marck's proposal for a conference at London to setthe Russia's claims.
