

NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. For some time past William McLean, a well-known pugilist, of this city, has been actively engaged in training for the purpose of fighting Jimmy Murray, a late pugilistic importation from the shores of Albion, the stake being a purse of \$1000.

Yesterday afternoon the stockholders of Swarthmore College held their annual meeting in the old meeting-house on Race street, above Fifteenth street.

A special meeting of the Board of Public Education was held yesterday afternoon, M. Hall Stanton, President, in the chair. The Board was convened to consider the appropriation for school purposes for the year 1871.

The amount made for the preceding year, then appropriated for the succeeding year, was \$1,000,000. The amount of appropriation for the year 1871 is not sufficient to meet the estimated expenses for 1871.
