## MEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. -For some time past William McLean, a weil-known pugilist, of this city, has been actively engaged in training for the purpose of fighting Jemmy Murray, a late pugilistic im-portation from the shores of Albion, the stake being a purse of \$1000. The affair came off at an early hour at a place near Elkton, Maryland, and resulted in McLean being declared the winner on a foul blow, received at the hands of his opponent. Only twentyfour rounds were fought.

-Yesterday afternoon the stockholders of Swarthmore College held their annual meeting in the old meeting-house on Race street, above Fifteenth street. Clement M. Biddle, clerk, presided. The reports of the managers and Treasurer were read, showing the college to be in a flourishing condition. There are now 245 pupils in the institution, 113 of whom are females.

-A special meeting of the Board of Public Education was held yesterday afternoon, M. Hall Stanton, President, in the chair. The Board was convened to consider the appropriation for school purposes for the year 1871. By an act of the State Legislature it was provided that if the Select and Common Councils of Philadelphia failed to make an appropriation by the first day of December, for school purposes for the succeeding year, then the amount made for the previous year shall be appropriated for the succeeding year. Councils failed to make an appropriation. The amount of appropriation for the year 1870 is not sufficient to meet the estimated expenses for 1871. It falls short \$51,000 and upwards. Without any motion having been made, a discussion arose as to what could and what could not be done. Whether the Councils had power to do this or that, or whether the Board of Public Education could so adjust matters and things as to relieve the Board from its dilemma. The subject gave rise to considerable discussion, and it was finally determined to ask Councils for a special appropriation or transfer certain items so as to meet the increased expenses of the coming vear.

### Domestic Affairs.

-The Legislature of Virginia meets to-day. -The West Point and Pension Appropriation bills are to be ready next week.

-The retaking of the census of New York city has been indefinitely postponed.

-A military wagon road from Prescott, Arizona, to New Mexico, has been completed.

-It is thought that the President's recommendation relative to new buildings for the War and Navy Departments will be defeated in the Appropriation Committee.

-Secretary Boutwell's proposed issue of three hundred millions of five per cent. bonds, the interest to be paid quarterly. seems to be favored by the Ways and Mean Committee.

-The trouble existing between the boo and shoemakers and their employers in New York, will, in all probability, be soon settled to the satisfaction of both parties.

-In the House yesterday, after the close of our report, resolutions were adopted of inquiry as to the accuracy of the census, and calling for correspondence relative to Spanis searches of American vessels from January t June, 1870. The President's message wa referred to the various committees. Ad journed.

THE MINT.

Interesting Facts and Figures. Hon, James Pollock, Director of the Mint in this city, has submitted his report of the operations of the Mint and branches, to the Secretary of the Trea-sary, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1870. The deposits of bullion at the Mint and branches during the fiscal year were as follows:-Gold, \$29,485,268:45; silver, \$3,584,942:51. Total deposits, frage 300.961.

amount now outstanding is but little, if any, in ex-cess of the actual demand. The medal department of the Mint was success-fully operated during the past year. A large num-ber of medals were made and sold.

ber of medals were made and sold. The cabinet of coins and medals still continues to attract a large number of visitors from every State in the Union, and from foreign countries. It de-serves the fostering care of the Government. The net profits of the nickel-copper and bronze coinage paid into the Treasury of the United States during the fiscal year were \$275,000.

# THE WAR.

## LAST NIGHT'S DESPATCHES.

DESPATCH FROM KING WILLIAM CONFIRMING THE RECENT VICTORIES-THE ARMY OF THE LOIRE RE-CROSSES THE MARNE,

HAVRE, Dec. 5-6 P. M.—All communication with the interior of France is severed. TOURS, Dec. 5.—The Government has received by balloon, from Paris, official reports, to December 4, of the progress and results of the movements of Ducrot. They state that Thursday was passed in burying the dead and succoring the wounded. On Friday the Prussians attacked with great impetiosity the French at Champigny and in front of Villiers. After seven hours fighting the enemy failed to carry the French positions, and retreated, leaving their dead and wounded on the field. Their losses were 15,000 to 20,000 (?). On Saturday the French re-crossed the Marne, and took up positions. The enemy made no attempt to resist them. Ducrot greatly distinguished himself in the battle of Friday. HAVEE, Dec. 5-6 P. M .- All communication with eneral Lapariera was killed and General Regnault is badly wounded. General Sonnetz, in his report, says the troops

who attacked the French were Saxons and Wurtem-bergers. The number exceeded 100,000, and their losses must have been extraordinary, for the next day they were so weak that they suffered the French to cross the river unopposed. The success of the French troops has created the wildest enthusiasm in Paris.
