MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

The Beethoven Society's Concert. The concert given on Saturday evening at the Academy of Music by the Beethoven Society, in honor of the centennial anniversary of Beethoven's birthday, was worthy of the occasion. The, programme was admirably arranged as an exhibit of the varieties of the composer's style, and the different selections were rendered in such excellent style that we have little but praise to utter in regard to the whole performance. The Beethoven Society is composed of some of the most talented and accomplished amateurs in the city. The chorus singing on Saturday was very much above the average. both in accuracy and expression; and it was creditable both to the society and Mr. Carl Wolfsonn, the musical director. The chorus, "The Heavens Proclaim," the famous quartette from Fidelio, arranged as a choras, and the "Hallelujah Chorus," were all given in very superior style. The quartette was encored, as it deserved to be, but beautiful as was the result, the propriety of arranging this number as a chorus is doubtful, as much of its value depends upon the characterization of the different parts and its dramatic expression, which are of course lost when it is sung by more than the four voices for which it is intended. The overture to Egmont, "which appropriately opened the performance, was finely performed by the erchestra, and the orchestral accompaniment to the other numbers in the programme was more than usually excellent, Mr. William Stoll, Jr., who has been steadily making a fine reputation as a violinist, performed the first movement, the concerto for the violin-the only work of this class that Beethoven ever producedin a very superior manner. This is much the most difficult and elaborte composition that Mr. Stoll has yet attempted in public, and the excellence of the performance was such that it will do much to advance his reputation. The scena and aria, "Ah Perfido," was sung by Mrs. Gibson Peacock with fine dramatic expression. This lady thas a rich and powerful voice and an admirable method, and a slight nervousness alone interfered with the entire success of her performance. Few singers unaccustomed to appearing in public, however, could have executed such a difficult composition in an equally brilliant style. The trio "Tremate emp'j Tremate," was very finely given by Miss Clara Lauderbach and Messrs, E. Dillingham and G. A. Conly. Miss Lauderbach has a very sweet, sympathetic, and cultivated voice. which was heard with admirable effect, and both in style and execution her singing was very far above the average. Messrs. Dillingham and Conly are both gifted with fine voices, and performed their parts in the trio in excellent style. The "Chorale Fantaisie" was fairly rendered by Mr. Wolfsohn. The orchestra and the chorus, and the "Andante" and "Finale" of the C minor symphony were performed with unusual precision and accuracy. The whole entertainment was decidedly one of the most successful of its class ever given in this city, and Mr. Wolfsohn, who has labored con amore, is entitled to great credit for the high state of discipline to which he has brought his forces. With such a beginning as it has made the success of the Beethoven Society may be considered as assured, and it will undoubtedly do much to cultivate a taste in this city for the higher forms of musical composition.


