FOREIGN ITEMS.

THE PRUBBIAN CAMP.

The Prussians always form their camp in the shape of a square, whatever may be the strength of the force obliged to bivousc. Their brigades, divisions, and army corps are distinguished by electric beacons, or ordi-nary lights covered with white or manycolored glasses, the object of which is, first, to mark the abode of the generals; secondly, to facilitate the communication of orders emanating from those in command. This mode of lighting might be introduced with advantage into the French army, for there have been many instances during the late campaign of orders from head. quarters never reaching the generals at all. The Prussian camps are guarded by sentries scattered on the wings and fronts, thirty or forty paces from each other, taking care to cross each other continually, so as to prevent any soldier or stranger from going out without orders, or entering with-out a safe conduct. The sentinels at the outposts are generally placed checkerwise, and united to the guards (who are placed in the manner prescribed by Frederick the Great) by little posts of cavalry charged with immediately informing the main body of any surprise. The fires are lit in the morning and let out at nightfall; no cooking is done by the Prussians when they srrive at the bivouac by night. There are scme fires to show the general direction of the line of sentries, but they cannot be seen, the flank on the side which the enemy might stlack being masked by slopes. The Prussians always throw up earthworks; they carefully avoid sounding clarions or beating drums, either in their camp or in action Every officer or soldier has a whistle which enables the chiefs to perform the different calls and the men to give warning of the approach of the enemy, to call each other, and to seek their company when they have strayed. The Prussians never use the drum and clarion except in a conquered country, as, for example, the Meuse.

AN EAST INDIAN FUNERAL.


A correspondent of the Delhi Gazette relates a terrible scene which occurred the other day at Etawah at the funeral service of a native. The corpse was brought to the banks of the Jun na to undergo the usual ceremony of burning. It was laid on the sand about fifteen yards from the water, while the men were preparing and stacking the wood. This done, the wood was fired so as to give some little time for a good blaze, and the men moved off to a little distance, squatting themselves down to have a smoke, when a huge crocodile, seemingly watching their movements, rushed out of the water, seized the corpse and doubled back, making a tremendous header into the river with the body between his jaws, leaving the followers and mourners in perfect bewilderment.

THE FRENCH MEDICAL SERVICE.

There is every reason to believe that the French medical service in the present war is far worse even than it was in the Crimean campaign. Nothing could be more complete than its failure on the latter occasion, when, out of a death-roll of 95,615, only about 20,000 men died on the field or of their wounds, while 75,000 perished by disease. The experience was bitter, but it had been forgotten as early as 1859, and the brief Italian campaign was a repetition of the same disastrons system as had been pursued in the Crimea. The deaths in hospital far outnumbered those in the field, even though the wounded had

sometimes to wait four days uncared for amid the dead and dying on the battle-ground. The two evils under which the French suffered were the insufficient supply of surgeons and the utter neglect of hygiene. Neither in Italy nor in the Crimea was there even one doctor to 1000 men, and in this respect the ambulances were far inferior to what they had been under the first Empire. Drainage, disinfection, good nurses, and abundant food were needed to reduce the fearful mortality in the hospitals, but for such matters as these the French administration cared nothing. Has it grown wires in the decade that has just expired ?

PRUSSIA'S SENSITIVENESS.

Prussia offers no exception to the general rule by which nations, like individuals, become bigger. She has hardly deigned to notice the accusations of cruelty which have been so freely levelled against her during the present war by her opponents. But Frederick the Great was less indifferent to remarks made upon him on this score, and when in 1759 it was asserted that prisoners of war in the Prussian territories were not well treated, his Majesty caused the following justification of his conduct to be sent to his Ministers at foreign courts:-

rowly observed. This is a resolution no one can blame. I am sufficiently authorized in it by the law of nations, and by the powers who are leagued against me—the court of Vienna having never suf-fered any of my officers that have fallen into their hands to go to Vienns, and the court of Russia hav-ing sent some of them even to Casan. However, as my enemies let slip no opportunity of blackening my most innocent proceedings. I have thought proper to acquaint you with my reasons for making this alteration with regard to the officers who are my prisoners, etc. my prisoners, etc.

FAITH AMONG NATIONS.

As there appears to be some doubt, says an English paper, whether it is absolutely necessary any longer for nations to keep faith with each other, and as it seems not impossible that under the new system of international law, which has its advocates, the old-fashioned doctrine that "Honesty is the best policy" will become barbarous and obsolete, it may be as well to call attention to a rebuke which England once drew upon herself before she acquired the reputation for respectable dowdyism she now enjoys. On the 25th of February, 1788, the Emperor of Morocco sent the following circular letter to all the European Consuls resi-dent within his dominions:-"In the name of God! To all the consuls: Peace to him who followeth the right way. Know ye that for these thirty years we have observed the conduct of the English, and studied their character: we have always found that they never keep their word. We never could dive into their character, because they have no other than that of telling lies. We are acquainted with the character of other Christian nations; we know that they keep their word: but a nation like the English, of which there is no knowing the character, who know not how to keep their word, and who can only tell lies, does not deserve that we should speak or write anything to them For, according to our religion, a lie is the most abominable of all vices. Their ambassador, Ourtis, told us that he had orders from his court that the ships built on our slips, and
