EUROPEAN AFFAIRS. LAST NIGHT'S DESPATCHES.

HE FRANCO-PRUSSIAN WAR-REPORTED COM-MENCEMENT OF THE PARIS BOMBARDMENT. LONDON, Dec. 27-Midnight.-The French rmy of the north is at Arras, having evacuted Corbie, Albert and Ascheux. Bismarck, n a note to the Austrian Cabinet, calls its nd trusts that the treaty of Prague will not nterfere with her development.

(Arras is thirty milles north from Amiens and intermediate between Amiens and Lisle. The Shipping Gazette, which at first loubted, now admits the truth of the report concerning the treatment of British vessels n the Seine by the Prussians, and declares hat the Government must instantly demand n explanation and redress from Prussia.

The Standard of to-day, in an editorial re-iewing the work of Dr. Francis Lieber on rbitration, expresses his opinion that, in the onsideration of the political as well as legal spects of the question, a royal umpire is referable to any faculty of law.

A delegation of the inhabitants of Luxemurg to-day presented to Prince Henry a atriotic address. The Prince, in reply, exressed confidence in their loyalty to defend he rights of the Duchy. He had faith in he justice of their cause and the loyalty of ne signers of the treaty of 1867.

London, Dec. 27 .- (Special to New York Vorld.) - A Versailles despatch of December says a scheme to assassinate the King, en Moltke, and Bismarck was discovered here a day or two before. A number of trangers arrived in the city on Wednesday, when the gates were closed, and all citizens ordered to remain in their houses on pain of death. Patrols then searched every place, and arrested 200 persons, of whom seventy were armed with guns and pistols.

The Manchester Guardian of to-morrow will contain a statement that King William and the Princess Royal of Prussia have written to Queen Victoria that they were opposed to the marriage of the Princess onisa with the Marquis of Lorne. The Queen in reply was vehement, and she told them to mind their own business. The incident has materially changed the feelings f the court toward Germany.

VERSAILLES, Dec. 27.-At a grand review of 20,000 national guards, held here on Monlay, Cremieux presented flags to several reiments, and made a speech, in which he sured the soldiers that the republic would nrely save France. The officers and men vere all enthusiastic in their views for the epublic, and as they passed the residence of he American Consul gave utterance to hearty demonstrations of friendship to the people of the United States.

A despatch from Susa announces that the lps were pierced through yesterday, and hat the workmen from both ends of the nountain tunnel joined in congratulations pon the completion of the great work.

DRESDEN, Dec. 27.—A despatch from the commanding general of the Saxon troops efore Paris announces that the bombardnent of Fort Avron commenced to-day. This fortification is the most advanced of the rench outworks east of Paris, and commands fount Avron, a considerable elevation six miles from the city walls.

Note-The works on Mount Avron have een erected since the war commenced, and to not comprise any part of the original deenses of Paris.

THE NEW INDIAN GOVERNMENT. Washington, Dec. 27.—Reports just re-ceived from the Indian Territory show that the Ockmulgee Council, convened under the treaty of 1866, is rapidly perfecting a satisfactory organization for the Indian nations living in the territory west of Arkansas. Twelve nations are represented, the principal of whom are the Cherokees, Choctaws, Chickasaws, and Osages. The Creeks have

not sent delegates. These delegates, fifty-three in number, re-present a population of about 41,000, while the total civilized population is not less than 54,000. The nomadic tribes not represented, but living within the boundaries, number about 9000 souls. The Council have agreed to form a sort of Federal Government, in which all the tribes shall be represented. Commissioner Parker, in addressing the Council, said that it was the wish of the Govthat they should form a protective confederacy, republican in character, for the government of the tribes within the Indian

A United States Court would be established among them, and it was expected that a delegate would be admitted to Congress. A resolution was passed inviting the Plain tribes, the Cheyennes, Arapahoes, Kiowas, etc., to join in the proposed federation, and urging them strongly to remain at peace with the whites. The council was at work, at date of last despatches, preparing a constitution, and in spite of some differences, the Cherokees having in part withdrawn, the proceedings are entirely satisfactory.
