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### MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

#### "Faust" by the German Troupe.

Gounod's Faust, whatever it may be as a scientific musical composition, has the great merit of being an admirable expression of the dramatic theme. The composer has preserved the peculiarly delicate flavor of the love passages of Goethe's poem, and the music of Faust, while it appeals directly to the popular taste, is seldom unpoetical or commonplace. The opera has gained in the favor of the public ever since its first production, and there are few compositions that can be heard with more pleasure. The performance last evening at the Academy of Music was very meritorious. Mad'lle Rosetti, who sustained the role of "Marguerite," has a soprano voice of much purity and sweetness, and a dramatic style that made her rendering of some of the scenes highly effective. She appeared to be somewhat timid at first, and the song of "The King of Thule" failed to excite much enthusiasm, while it made a favorable impression on the audience. Afterwards she became more at her ease, and the whole of the garden scene with "Faust" was exceedingly well done. Throughout the balance of the opera Mad'lle Rosetti gained upon the regards of her audience both as an actress and a s'ager, and when the curtain fell upon the lest act she had achieved a very decided success, and was deservedly complimented by a call before the curtain. Another new singer, Mr. Adolph Franosch, appeared as "Mephistopheles," and made a very favorable impression. Mr. Habelmann as "Faust" acted and sang better than he has done for a long time. Mr. W. Formes made an excellent "Valentine." The role of "Siebel" has been more ably sustained than it was by Miss Roemer, although she sang the music correctly and with expression. This lady's voice lacks both power and sweetness, and she consequently failed to reach the standard of excellence that has been attained by other representatives of "Marguerite's" boy lover.
