MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

"Don Glovanai" by the German Troupe. The largest audience of the season was attracted last evening by the performance of Mozart's great opera of Don Giovanni, a work that never palls upon the taste, and that is always well worth hearing no matter how imperfectly it may be rendered. The performance last evening, like those previously given by the German troupe, was distinguished by a general evenness of merit rather than by any great qualities. There were imperfections, especially in the concerted passages, none of which were perfectly sung, but, taking it as a whole, the opera was better done than it frequently has been, while two of the principal roles, "Donna Anna" and "Leporello," were sustained by thoroughly compe'ent artists, Madame Lichtmay and Carl Formes. The lady sang with admirable dramatic matic expression, and it is worthy of note that she introduced the celebrated "letter aria" which has been omitted of late years on account of its difficultics by every prima donna except Madame Parepa-Rosa. Carl Formes has long been celebrated as one of the best representatives of "Loporello" on the stage, and as he was in excellent voice last night, his performance was greatly enjoyed. The part of "Zerlina" was oreditably represented by Mad'lle Haffner, although she is far from being equal either as an actress or singer to many of the artists who have appeared in it. The weakest performance was that of "Douna Elvira" by Mad'lle Roemer, whose vocal abilities were scarcely equal to the reguliements of the role. The other parts were creditably sustained, Mr. Bernard appearing as "Don Octavio," Mr. Vierling as "Don Giovanni," and Mr. Franosch as the "Commander."
