FROM NEW YORK.

The Trial of Dr. Launhau. New York, Jan. 14.—The investigation by the Book Committee into the charges against Dr. Lauahan was continued this morning. E. L. Faucher, for the prosecution, offered in evidence a copy of the N. Y. Times of September 21, 1869, containing the article which first brought to light the alleged frauds.

Judge Reynolds objected to the article being read, as it was in no manner connected with the defendant.

Mr. Faucher replied that he proposed to connect the article with the defendant by means of a letter written by the defendant himself. Mr. Reynoids still objected on the ground that the vidence was not admissible and would not be con-dered so in any court.

Mr. Faucher replied they were not in a court of law, and were to take into consideration many things which courts would not admit.

The question was debated at length, and a call made upon the chairman to decide the question.

The Rev. Mr. Backs stated he was not sitting as a judge, and any decision he made would be on points of order. If anything else course before in

points of order. If anything else came before him it should be decided by the committee, Mr. Reynolds continued that the respondent had been brought before the committee to answer certain charges, and that his main defense was that rules of evidence which have been settled by usage should e observed. The article offered was not evidence, as there was

othing to connect it with the defendant, and to now that he knew anything about it until its publication. The investigation should be conducted the same as a court of justice,

Mr. Paucher contended that the investigation

was not a trial, and the ordinary rules of evidence General Runyon thought it singular that the opposite side should point out to them what course they should pursue. They would connect the letter with the defendant at the proper time, and would prove that though the accused had not written the letter, he was introduced in the proper time. he was instrumental in its production. After further debate the article was admitted and

H. Nesbitt, editor of the Christian Adeccate, of Pittsburg, to the Rev. Dr. Carleton, enclosing a number

Washington, Jan. 14.—The following Executive orders were to-day issued:—
EXECUTIVE MANSION, Jan. 14, 1871.—By virtue of authority vested in me by the 18th section of the act contiled An act to reduce internal taxes and for other purposes, approved July 14, 1870, it is hereby ordered that the following adjoining

Collection Districts in the State of New York be annexed to and united with each other, and here-after compose but one district, to wit:—the First, Second, and Third districts, as now constituted, to be hereafter known and designated as the First Collec-tion District of the State of New York.

The Fourth and Sixth districts to be hereafter known and designated as the Second New York

Collection District.

And the Fifth and Seventh districts to be hereafter known and designated as the Third Collection District of New York.

This order to take effect on and after the first of February, A. D. 1871.

U. S. GRANT.

The New Pennsylvania Districts. Similar orders have been issued for the consolida-tion of collection districts in Pennsylvania and Ohio, in the following manner:—

Pennsylvania—The First and Third districts to be hereafter known and designated as the First dis-trict. The Second and Fourth districts to be nere-after known and designated as the Second Collec-Ohio-The First and Second districts, as now constituted, to be hereafter known and designated as
