MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

" The Wife" at the Chesnut. There is not one of James Sheridan Kno sles dramas that does not bear the impress of genius, and his best works have very few superlors among the plays that keep possession of the stage. Among the best is the very beautiful drama of The Wife, which was played last night, amid much applause, at the Chesnut; for, although it is not equal to The Hunchback, it possesses remarkable merits and belongs to a class of works the writing of which almost appears to be a lost art. Knowles' admiration for the Elizabethan dramatists often led him into the error of attempting an imitation of their literary style. Imitations by an immutable law of art are invariably inferior to their originals, and the language of Knowles' plays is frequently forced and marked by such violent involutions as to make them exceedingly difficult for the actors to study, while some of his scenes, particularly his comic ones, are scarcely more than burlesques of Shakespeare's style. Knowles, however, was a man of real ability, and he was, moreover, a thoroughly conscientious worker. His very faults grew out of an earnest desire to produce really good work, and his plays, with all their faults, are indisputably the best that have been produced during the present century by any English writer. The plot of The Wife is sufficiently removed from the probabilities of every-day life to lift it into the region of romance, and as it is poetleal in its conception so is it admirable in dramatic treatment. Although not acted as frequently as some other plays, it is deservedly a favorite both with the actors and the public, and when it is well acted it is most excellent entertain-We are pleased at being able to bestow very

hearty praise upon the performance of this play at the Chesnut last evening. All the leading characters were well represented, and the occasion was made additionally interesting by the appearance of Mrs. E. L. Davenport in the role of "Mariana," This lady has not played in this city for a number of years, but she is well remembered by many of our citizens as an actress of great merit, and she proved conclusively last evening that she has during her retirement lost none of her powers. Her "Mariana" was a chaste, beautiful, and most affecting performance. It commenced upon a low key and increased in intensity and force as the drama progressed, every scene and every point being elaborated with a fine art that could only proceed from thorough culture as well as great natural abilities. It was impressive without being disfigured by any straining for mere effect, the actress being so sure of her powers, and her artistic method so true, that she was able to give an air of vivid reality to the different cenes without the apparent consciousness of

Mr. Davenport's personation of "Julian St.

Pierre" was also a most admirable piece of acting. It was true to nature and to poetry, and it realized the true end and aim of high dramatic art by making the audience forget the actor in the part he is representing. Mr. Davenport and his wife are artists of the same school, and we say unhesitatingly that it is the best school with which the public of the present day are acquainted, and our play-goers may expect to see a series of entertainments at the Chesnut during the present season, with Mr. and Mrs. Davenport at the head of a company that contains some fine talent, that will most certainly be enjoyed and remembered with plea-The other parts in the play last evening were for the most part well represented, Mr. Thorne giving an carnest and spirited personation of "Leonardo Gonzales," and Mr. Nagle an effective but somewhat exaggerated filling out of the character of "Ferrardo Gonzales." This last-named gentleman has fine talents, and he will make a first-rate "heavy" man when he gets rid of a disposition for mere melodramatic acting and acquires a refinement of style that he does not now possess, and which he cannot acquire better or quicker than by taking a few lessons of his manager, than whom no actor upon the stage understands better the distinction between exaggeration and real force.

FROM EUROPE.

Results of the Recent Buttles-Despatch from King William. LONDON, Jan. 17-12-20 A. M.—King William telegraphs to Queen Augusta from Versatlles, on January 16, that the number of prisoners captured in and since the battles of Le Mans has increased to fully 20,000. Four locomotives and four hundred wagons are among the spolls.

Skirmish at Belare. A despatch from Versailles says a German detachment was attacked at Briare on January 14th by a superior French force, but succeeded in escaping by cutting its way through the enemy's lines.

Chanzy's Army. Advices from Laval to January 16 state that the army of Chanzy has retreated in excellent order, and reached its new positions on the 14th

Fifty thousand French troops left Cherbourg to reinforce Chanzy, and others are to be sent at once.

FROM THE WEST.

Speech of General Frank Blair upon Recon-struction.

St. Louis, Jan. 17.—On Friday last a resoluion was introduced in the lower house of the Legislature by Major Pope, of St. Louis, endorsing the thirteenth, fourteenth, and fifteenth amendments to the Federal Constitution and the policy of the General Government, and favoring the payment of the State and National indebtedness according to several contracts upon which the indebtedness is based. The resolution was debated during the morning hour on Friday and Saturday and continued yesterday.

It had been stated that the resolution was introduced to force General Blair if possible to sustain his position taken in his famous letter to Colonel Brochead, in 1868, and upon which he was nominated in the National Democrat a Convention or to recede from it.

Yesterday Gen. Blair, on a motion to refe Major Pope's resolution to the Committee on l'ederal Relations, of which Blair is chairman, spoke to the question, stating that he was in favor of the fifteenth amendment and believed the South generally assented to it, but the reconstruction acts he declared unconstitutional, and referred to the decision of the Supreme Court in the case of Cummings against the State of Missouri; also to the case of Milligan and Bowles, who were tried by a military commission in Indiana during

Referring to his letter to Colonel Brodhead,

he used the following language:

"Had sir, my letter which has been referred to the contents that the military should be made to undo their nusrpations at the South, I say so still, and you have only to withdraw them from the South, and their work will be undone. (Applause.) That carrion crew of carpet-baggers, who are gorged upon the plun-der and drusk with the blood of the vanquished people of the South, will disperse themselves in an instant if not sustained by the bayonets of the Federal Government. There is no item in that letter that I take back. I stand by it.

"I believe in the construction given to the Constitution of the United States by the Supreme Court, that this reconstruction was unconstitu-tional. My hope in going to Congress, if I should attain that high position, is that I may aid in withdrawing the troops from those Southern States, which are held there to saddle upon the backs of that people a parcel of carpet-baggers and scalawags, followed by an igno rant mass of negroes, and if the people of the South, who have shown a disposition to abide in good faith by the arbitrament of arms, renew their allegiance to the Government, they will be allowed to resume self-government among themselves, as we have done in Missouri, and whilst I may not expect to carry with me the gentleman from St. Louis, I believe that we can surely and certainly count upon the cooperation of the large body of liberal men who assisted us in relieving ourselves from a similar tyranny in the State of Missouri."

The speech concluded with a rather savage assault upon John B. Henderson, a portion of whose career during the early part of the war is not very delicately handled. He forgives all past misdeeds of the gentleman, however, for the position he took in the impeachment trial of Andy Johnson.
