#### OBITUARY.

Peter Richings. The venerable actor, Peter Richings, died is evening at his farm near Media, from injuries re ceived on the 18th of December last, when he was thrown from his carriage while going to church. Mr. Richings was for so many years identified with the Philadelphia stage, and he had co many warm personal as well as professional friends here, that the announcement of his death will be received with general regret. Both as a finished actor and as a high toned, honorable gentleman, he was fully entitled to the cordial esteem in which he was held; and although he had retired from the stage, and in his old age was enjoying the fruits of a long life of honorable labor in the cause of art, his sudden death will be none the less regretted by those who regarded him as among the last of a glorious line of dramatic artists who have done honor to the Ameri-

can stage Mr. Richings was born at Kensington, London, on May 19, 1797, and he was consequently seventythree years of age at the time of his death. His father was a Vice-Admiral in the British navy, and his family was in the best sense of the word respectable. Mr. Richings at an early age had predilections for the stage, and as usual on such occasions he was obliged to contend against the opposition of his friends. He persisted, however, in adopting the profession for which he felt that his talents and inclinations litted him, and on the 25th of August, 1821, he sailed for the United States to try his fortunes on this side of the Atlantic. On his arrival he made the acquaintance of Mr. Sunpson, the manager of the Park Theatre, New York, who was so favorably impressed with him that he gave him an engagement. On the 25th of September he made his first appearance on the stage at the Park Theatre in the character of "Harry Bertram" in the drama of Guy Manuering, and made a very favorable impression. He played for two years at the Park Theatre, learning the routine of his profession and making steady progress by his strict attention to his duties and by his carnest desire to do well whatever he had to do. At the close of the second year of his engagement at the Park Theatre an extravaganza entitled Tom and Jerry was produced, and Mr. Richings made his first great hit by his personation of "Dick Triffe." This part was in the line of business for which Mr. Richings was afterwards most celebrated, and the brilliant success which he achieved in it gave him a cue that enabled him to tread the way to fame and fortune more rapidly than ever. For sixteen years after his first great hit Mr. Richings was identified with the Park Theatre, and was one of the most popular actors on the New

York start. Mr. Richings came to Philadelphia in 1840, and made his first appearance here at the old Na Ional Theatre on the 31st of August as "Captain Abaointe" in Sheridan's comedy of The Rivals. The National had formerly been used as a circus, and had recently been converted into a regular theatre. and placed under the management of Mr. W. E Burtor. Mr. Richings became a great favorite immediately, and after the destruction of the National by fire he weat to the old Chesnut Street Theatre, then managed by Pratt, where he tilled the responsible post of stage manager. The season at the Chesnut closed premuturely, and Mr. Richings made his first appearance at the Walnut Street Theatre, with which he was for so many years identified both as actor and stage manager, 18 "Dazzle" in London Assurance, Mr. E. L. Davenport sustaining the character of "Charles Courtley." in 1843 he went to Baltimore and managed the Holiday Street Theatre for one season. In the following year he returned to Philadelphia, and became a member of the Walnut Street Tacatre company, under the management of Mr. E. A. Mirshall, H. succeeded Mr. Slake as stage manager at the Wainut in 1845. Mr. Richings was attached to the Wainer between eight and nice years, and bis abilities as an actor, and his fluo Liste and thorough knowledge of his profession, made him one of the most poou ar stage managers ever connected with the theatres of Philadelphia.

It was while acting as stage manager at the Walnut that Mr. Richings introduced his adopted daughter, Miss Caroline Richings-now Mrs. Ber-

nard-to the public. This laty was born in England, and was brought to this country by her parents when quite a small child. Her father's name was Reynoldson, and he was well known as a writer for the press and an adapter of plays. His pecualary success, however, was not great, and when he died he left bis little giri entirely unprovided for. Mr. Richings adopted her, and from that time to the hour of his death he acted more than a father's part towards bec. Both in public and in private he always displayed the warmest affection for her, and her success is very largely due to his fatherly care, He gave her an excellent education, and as she early gave indications of having a fine voice, Mr. Richings provided the best masters for her, and took great pains to cultivate her musical talent to the utmost. The first actual appearance in public of Miss Richings was as a planist, on November 20, 1847, at the first concert of the Philharmonic Society at Musical Fund Hall. She appeared for a second time on the 15th of December in the same year. Miss Richings made her debut on the stage on the 9th of February, 1852, with the Seguin troupe at the Walnut Street Theatre. It was her ambition, as well as that of her adopted father, to distinguish herself as a prema donna, but the disbandment of the Seguin troupe deprived her for the time being of opportuaity to do so. She nevertheless held fast to the idea of achieving success in English opera, and within a few years past she has been able to carry out her plans in that direction. In the meantime she cultivated both her vocal and dramatic talents, and achieved a high reputation as an actress and as a singer. Miss Richings made her first appearance as a comedicane at the Walaut on March 21, 1853, for the benefit of Mr. Peter Rich-Ings, in the part of "Stella" in the comedy of The Prima Donna, which was produced for the first time in America on that occasion. She afterwards appeared in the comedy of Extremes, the operatic spectacle of The Enchantress, and a number of other similar pieces that afforded her opportunities to display her vocal and histrionic talents. After leaving the Walnut, Mr. Richtags and his daughter played star engagements for a time, and on the 7th of March, 1887, Miss bichings made her debut in Italian opera at the Academy of Music in this city, which had then just been inaugurated, Mr. Peter Richings delivering the inaugural address on the opening night. Miss Richings' first Italian opera vele was "Adelgisa" in Norma, and she afterwards appeared in "Azucena" in Trovatore, and in similar parts. During the dramatic season of 1857-58 Miss Richings was a member of the Walnut Street Theatre Company. She left the Walnut In January, 1859, and for several years travellest as a star.

In September, 1865, Miss Richings appeared as the leader of the Richings English Opera Troupe, and achieved a success that the public is familiar with, and succeeded apparently in making English opera, what it had never been before, permanently fashionable and popular. It is well understood that the excellence of the performance given by this troupe was in a very large measure due to the exertions of Mr. Peter Richings, who was the actual if not the nominal manager; and until the marriage of his adopted daughter she had the nenetit of his talents and experience. The last appearance of Mr. Richings was at the Academy of Music in this city, when he personated "Chevaller Renard" in Auber's opera of La Fiancee. The occasion was further made memorable by the presentation to Miss Richings of a handsome service of allver by Colonel James Page, in behalf of the directors of the Academy of Music. Mr. Richings proposed taking a formal farewell to the stage, but was prevented from doing so by his sudden death.

Richings was in his prime one Mr. the best general actors on the American stage, and whatever he undertook to do he did well. He was particularly distinguished, however, for his elegant light comedy and his personation of fops. His "Mercutio" and his "Sir Peter Teazle, ' will be especially remembered by old theatre-goers as finished performances, while in a round of first-class parts he had few equals. Mr. Richings was a gentleman in the best sense of the word, and
