As soon as the dog was ar her, he arose on his hind feet and atmpted to seize Mrs. Huff by the throat.

Then ensued a combat between the woman nd dog of about ten minutes duration, and which for its fierceness scarcely has a parallel a such encounters. Mrs. Huff first threw out her left arm, which the dog bit fearfully near he wrist, and with her right hand caught the afuriated brute by the throat, and as soon as er left hand was released from the grip of dog she seized his under jaw with t. Knowing from every circumstance that his combat would be a lengthy one, as oon as the first excitement had subsided, frs. Huff ordered the family to close every oor but one, towards which she gradually but lowly drew the dog. Before reaching the steps n front of the open door, the dog had for a hort time partially disengaged himself, and bit firs. Huff severely on the left thigh. Finally he had reached the doorsteps, and began to yalk up them backwards, and when at the top he, by summoning all her strength, and by one ident effort, threw the dog to the ground on is back. Before the animal could recover his eet and ascend the steps, Mrs. Huff had en-ered the house and closed the door, and at once inted. Her wounds were examined and ressed by a skilful physician, who pronounced er case almost hopeless. Her face, arms, and mbs a few hours after had swollen to double heir natural size, the poison from the bite aving in a few hours diffused itself throughout er whole body.
