OUR NEW STEAMSHIPS.

The American Steamship Company.

We give below the full text of the bill to incorporate the American Steamship Company, the passage of which is now being obstructed in the State House of Representatives. This company is engaged in perfecting a great enterprise that will have a powerful lufluence upon the prosperity not only of the city of Philadelphia but of the State of Pennsylvania, and yet such immaculate representatives of the people as Messrs, Albright, Cloud, Duffy, Dumbell, Hagar, Lamon, McGowan, Mooney, Quigley, and Thompson-the Philadelphia members who refused to suspend the rules on Thursday -put on a virtuous air, and affecting to believe that there may be in it a snake of gigantic dimensions, declare that they must have time to examine into it before they can conscientiously vote for it. The bill, as our readers can see for themselves, is brief, and any man of ordinary intelligence can peruse it in a few minutes, and understand all its points without the slightest difficulty. It asks for no extra privileges for the Pennsylvania of acting, but it is not the only Railroad Company, nor any for the steamship company itself that ought not to be granted, and the great outerprise it seeks to legalize is one that is in every way worthy of the cordial support and encouragement of the Legislature. Such a bill ought to be passed without the slightest difficulty, and the public will not be deceived as to the real character of the opposition to it, or the motives of the Philadelphia members who on Thursday voted against the suspension of the rules, and thus con-gned it to the committee. We sincerely hope that the steamship company will show the proper pluck in this matter, and utterly refuse to expend a single dollar to procure the passage of the bill. It is important that the company should be incorporated at as early a day as possible, but if it once yields to the demands of corrupt legislators, it will find ere it has gone far that the bleeding process is an unending one. There is no counting upon what certain members of the Pennsylvania Legislature may or may not do, but we scarcely think that the House of Representatives will dare to refuse affirmative action on this bill, although its passage may be impeded until there is no longer any hope that the company will come down with the "stamps." It would be better, however, to submit to this than to the extortionate demands of certain conscienceless members of the Legislature who scarcely take the trouble to deny that they are on the make from the hour they enter II serisburg until they leave it. The following is the text of the bill in full as passed by the Senate: -

An Act to Incorporate the American Steamship Gompany of Philidelphia.

Whereas, It is a matter of great importance to this Commonwealth and to its citizens generally, that a line of American built vessels. should be established between the ports of Philadelphia and Europe, and it is proper that the Commonwealth should extend liberal grants and franchises to promote and encourage such an enterprise; therefore,

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Common wealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That J. of this Commonwealth for the guarantee of the rayment of the principal and interest, or either, of any bonds or obligations which may be issued by it; and any corporation so subscribling, purchasing, contracting, or guaranteeing is hereby fully authorized and empowered so to do, and all acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

Mr. Rufus Adams as "sir Peter Tenzle." Sheridan's brilliant comedy of The School for Fcandal was performed last night at the Arch for the purpose of introducing Mr. Rufus Adams In the character of "Sir Peter Teazle." Mr. Adams has a high reputation as a teacher of elocution, and he is probably as good a judge of acting as there is in the country. There is a vast difference, however, between knowing how a thing ought to be done and how to do it. If the situation were otherwise, what magnificent actors all the critics would be !- and Mr. Adams, by his "Sir Peter Teazle," even more than his "Shylock," demonstrated very by clearly that he has not mastered all the technicalities of the art histrionic. Elocution is a very important element of the art element worthy of attention, by any means; and on the stage a man who has plenty of the right kind of action although he may be an execrable reader, will succeed where one who is merely a good elocationist will make but little impression. "Sir Peter Teazle" is a character that will almost act itself in reasonably competent hands, and it requires a fine physique even more than eminent ability. Mr. Adams certainly looked the part last night, as he possesses all the personal advantages necessary for its successful personation, but he lacked sympathy with it, and his performance was cold and colorless, although correct enough as a piece of reading. Mr. Adams' deficiencies were especially apparent in the quarrel scene, where Mrs. Drew's brilliant acting as "Lady Teazle" completely threw him in the shade. Mr. Adams is not a mere amateur, and yet he is not strictly a professional. His performance, therefore, is open to criticism, while it is entitled to a certain amount of lenient judgment. Some of his greatest deficiencies last evening may be attributed to want of practice as a professional actor, which prevented him from feeling perfectly at ease on the stage.

"The Hunchback" at the Chesnut.

There are few plays better worth seeing than The Hunchback, and the audience in attendance at the Chesnut Street Theatre last evening had the pleasure of witnessing a more than usually good representation of it. The "Julia" of Miss Glover was a very charming performance, and it made a more favorable impression than anything she has yet done in this city. Miss Glover has a slight impediment in her speech that is notjunpleasant in itself, but that prevents her from being heard distinctly at all times, and she is to a certain extent deficient in power. Those who sit nearest to the stage, therefore, are best able to appreciate some of the best parts of her acting, and to understand how really fine her abilities are. Miss Glover is able to represent passion and emotion without rant, and in this she presents a most favorable contrast to Mrs. Scott-Siddons, who last played the part of "Julia" at the Chesnut. What she lacks in force she makes up in expression, and her performance last evening was refined, elegant, and thooughly artistic-such a performance few stock actresses we have had in this city of late years could equal. Mr. Davenport's "Master Walter" was of course admirable in every respeet, and the other parts were, almost without exception, well sustained. The house was filled with a large and fashionable audience, and the performance was liberally applauded throughout, Miss Glover, Mr. Davenport, and Mr. Thorne, who personated "Clifford," being several times called before the wathin.

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appointed commissioners, who, or any nine of whom, shall have the power and authority to open books and receive subscriptions at the Merchants' Exchange, in the city of Philadelphia, to the capital stock of the company created by this act; and upon the subscription of seven thousand shares said books shall be closed, and the subscribers to the capital stock be notified by advertisement, for not less than five days in at least three newspapers in the city of Philadelphia, to meet the said Merchants' Exchange and at complete the organization of the company, by the election of nine directors, one of whom shall be designated as president, and all of whom shall be citizens of Pennsylvania; and thereupon it shall be the duty of the G versor of the Commonwealth, upon being certified of such subscriptions, and of the election of a president and directors, to issue letters patent under the great seal of the Commonwealth. Incorporating said company as a body politic and corporate under the name, style, and title of the American Steamship Company of Philadelphia, and by the same name, style, and title the company shall have perpetual succession, and be able and capable in law to sue and be sued, to plead and be impleaded, to have a common seal, and to possess and exercise all such rights and powers as are or may be useful to a corporation having for its object the receiving, storing, loading, delivering, and transportation of passengers and of mails, of goods, wares, merchandise, and traffic of any description, by means of steam or other vessels between Philadelphia and Liverpool or other European ports. Section 3.
