FROM EUROPE.

The Emperor Not to Return to Berija Uatli Pence is Declared. LONDON, Feb. 1 .- (Special to the N. Y. Telegram.)—A despatch from Berlin, Jan. 30th, states that the report is unfounded that it is the intention of the Emperor of Germany to return to Berlin. The Emperor will not return to Germany until the conclusion of the negotiations for peace.

Rejoicing Over the Prospect of the War Ter-A despatch from Amiens states that on Jan 28th a despatch was received from Versailles, announcing the cessation of hostilities. The

announcement was made in the name of Ven Moltke, and caused immense excitement. This has been followed by a sudden calm, and the change in the attitude of the two armies is marvellous to behold. Before, they were watching for an opportunity to kill one another; they now halt when they meet and mingle together in groups, indulging in pleasant chat. The German soldiers look forward to the return of

peace with great demonstrations of joy. On Jan. 31st the news of the armistice was received at Amiens in a short, decisive telegram. The effect of this news upon the people was indescribable. Joy and delight were everywhere manifested at the prospect of the close of the

There was a disposition at first to pay no attention to the news of the armistice on the part of the army on the Somme, but later despatches changed their attitude, and the Germans and French embraced each other. The great theme of satisfaction with the German soldiery is the speedy prospect of returning to fatherland. They all want to go home.

Murphy offered the following resolution:—

Reselved, If the Assembly concur, That section 2
of the Constitution be amended so that it shall read,
as follows:—"Laws may be passed excluding from
the rights of surface all persons who have been or the rights of suffrage all persons who have been or may be convicted of bribery or larceny or of any in-famous crime, and for depriving every person who shall make or become directly interested in any bet or wager depending upon the result of any election or who shall pay, give, or receive, or promise to pay or give money, or other property, or valuable con-sideration, with intent to indused any elector in giving his vote or to deter any elector from voting at such election or from holding any office voted for

at such election.
