METHECAL AND DRAMATEC.

Theodore Thomas' First Concert. The concerts given in this city last season by Mr. Thomas were only partially successful in attracting the attention they deserved from the public. The fact is, they were absolute surprises to a large number of those who attended them, and the number of performances given was too limited to make a proper impression on the general public. Mr. Thomas and his orchestra, however, established a reputation that in the future will most certainly insure large and appreciative audiences. The three entertainments announced for last night, this afternoon, and to-night have excited the greatest interest, and the attendance at the Academy at the first concert last evening was as large and appreciative as could be desired.

The performance was one in regard to which it is impossible to say anything but praise. The selections were excellent, and exhibited the characteristics of widely different schools of music. They combined the grave and gay, the scientific and the merely popular, in a manner calculated to sult the tastes of a miscellaueous but not uncultured audience, while the perfect style in which they were rendered was itself a rare pleasure to all who listened to them. Mr. Thomas not only has his orchestra in perfect training, but being something more than a musical drill-master, he is able to express all the sentiment and sensuous charms of music in such a manuor as no other leader we have ever had here has done. The first part of the programme last evening presented compositions of somewhat e ab state character, and consisted of the Tannhauser overture, an "adagio" from Beethoven's Prometheus; a "Polonaise" by Weber, with instrumentation by Liszt, and Liszt's symphonic 1 oem of "Les Preludes." The second part was of somewhat lighter music, and was made up of the overlule to Nicolai's Merry Wives of Windsor, Schumann's "Treumeral," Strauss' "Blue Danube" waltz, a "Nocturne" by Chopin, a Tarantelle by Liszt, a polka mazourka and polka schnell by Strauss, and the overture to Ambroise 'Thomas' Mignon.

Miss Anna Mehlig executed the "Polonaise" in the first part and the "Nocturne" and "Tarantello" in the second part in such a manner as to prove herself a planist of the first rank. She is undoubtedly one of the most accomplished lady performers on the piano we have had in this city. She fully deserved the cordial applause that greeted her efforts last evening. The plano used last evening by Miss Mehlig was a Steinway grand, from the warerooms of Blasius Brothers, No. 1006 Chesnut street. This magnificent instrument was remarkable for its purity and brilliancy of tone, and deserves special mention. We regret that Mr. Thomas and his fine combination of talent propose making such a brief stay in Philadelphia at present, and it is to be hoped that the enthusiasm manifested by the large audience at the Academy last evening will have the effect of inducing them to return soon and often.

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
