devise new rules for the government of the conventions of ths Republican party of Phi-
ladelphia has at last been completed, and we believe it is to be aoted upon by the oonven-
tion this afternoon. As many months of arduous labor were devoted to the proparation
of this precions document, it was natural to oxpeot that it would en
plan for the eradioation
ovils evils which have hitherto been
matters of general complaint, and that
it would make many radical changes
in a syatem which is well known to be inherently vioions and bad. Any man who reads
the rules with the hope that they will pave the way for a thorongh reform, however, will
be sad y disappointed. They provide maobinery that is likely to prevent unseemly
hand-to-band struggles over the primary
ehairmanship of the respective conventions, ohairmanship of the respective conventions,
by deolaring that a member of the City Ex-
eontive Committee shall act as the prelimieoutive Committee shall aot as the prelimi-
nary chairman of each convention; but beJond this questionable virtue we searcely see
another new provision that is worthy of an Instant's favorable consideration. The true
titlo of the new rales should, be "a acheme to bind more olosely than over more than
fifty thousand Republican voters of Philadelphia to the triumphant ehariot
whe sls of a handful of wire-pullers, whose whesls of a handful of wire-paliers, whose
loa ling aim is self-agrandizement at the
oxp nee of the publio." The rules were manifoatly framed to enable a ring or a fow rings
to rale or ruin the Republioan party of
 body a single reform of real
Inportance. Instead of giving enlarged
powers to the poople and increasing the
ohances of good nominations, they diminish the powers hitherto exeroised and inerease the probabilities that nominations for places
of honor and profft will be monopolized by plunder. The rules provide that no Republican oan vote at a delegate election unless he is proviously registered, and by a series of ingenious arravgements the whole machinery
of the party is passed over absolately to the
control of the hacks who manipulate the primary oleotions for officers to hold delegate eleotions, the appointment of the partisan
registering officera, and the choice of members of the City Exeoutive Committee, who will virtually control, in a great measare, each
of the different conventions. In all nominations made under this systom
fow adroit managers and their tools will exer eise a paramount influence, and the body of the Republioan voters will have little more voioe
in the nominations than in the selection of in the nominations than in the seleotion of
an Emperor for China. We know it may be said, in reply to this objeetion, that voter
who do not attend to the drudgery of ean onses, repeated partisan eleotions, and con
ventions do not deserve to have a voice in nominations, but the fallacy of this argamenn
 and espeoially of those who are not profes
gi manal placo-hunters, in the selootion of eandidatos; but the tendency of the new ralos in
