The Rob Roy quickly gained the shore, land-ing alongside the steamer Rubicon, and an excited crowd rushed on board.

Mr. Nash, keeper of the camels and elephanta, was precipitated into the river, landing between the two camels. He was taken out by a bridge boat. His head is pretty badly cut and he is bruised on his person, but it is thought no bones were broken. Nash has been in the camel and elephant keeping line for over thirty years. During sis career be has been in many tight places, but the tightest place he ever experienced was between those two camels in mid-river.

A spar was forced against a wagon or cage containing an ostrich and killed the gay bird. A passenger named Moffat, carrying his child on a plank to the Rubicon, after the accident, fell into the river and would have been lost but for the courage and energetic action of a bystander.

A deck passenger was knocked overboard, but he was rescued with slight bruises. The boat was towed down to the Keokuk wharf-boat last night, where repairs were immediately commenced.
