

LIFE INSURANCE IN NEW YORK.

The Amount of Business for 1870—Statistics of the Three Great City Companies—Rapid Progress of the Equitable.

Soon after the opening of the new year, when the returns from the different life insurance companies have come in, a carefully prepared and digested chart, as it is called, is published, showing the relative standing as to business done, expenses incurred, and assets accumulated, of the various companies doing business in New York. The returns are those made to the State Superintendent of Insurance at Albany, and as nearly every life insurance company of any account whatever does this, to do business in New York, the chart becomes a fair and clear exhibit of the relative standing of the companies in the Union.

The total number of policies issued by New York city companies in 1870 was 129,772 insuring the various amounts for the year 1870. But, great as these figures are, they yet fall below those of the year 1869 and some preceding years, the explanation of this fact being that people have not been making so much money during the last twelve months as they did during the previous years. The receipts of life insurance companies, like those of savings banks, though not exactly representing, yet indicate the relative saving capacity of the country from year to year. But while less than in some former years, when business was brisk and everybody prosperous, the returns for 1870 still afford striking evidence of the prudence and thrift of the people.

The progress of life insurance in New York is shown by the following figures:—The total number of policies in force since December 31, 1860, was 224,188, amounting to \$14,744,815. The total number of policies in force December 31, 1870, was 372,063, insuring \$1,028,385,818; or an increase of 66,875 policies in companies belonging to New York State alone. When it is remembered that this increase has been effected by the usual reduction by reason of death and term claims and surrendered policies, it can hardly be doubted that life insurance has made a handsome gain during the year, and that our New York companies have not only maintained their hold on the confidence of the public.

The three city companies which show the largest aggregate amount of insurance effected during the year are:—

Equitable, \$40,235,190 Mutual Life, \$33,453,217 New York Life, \$27,141,185

The number of new policies issued by these companies was:—

Mutual, 12,463 Equitable, 10,063 New York, 9,923

The average amount insured under these policies was:—

Equitable, \$4,004 New York, \$3,735 Mutual, \$2,284

The increased ratio of assets over 1869 was:—

Equitable, 30 31 Mutual, 15 76 New York, 20 21

These figures show that our leading companies are in a healthy and progressive condition. The long-standing Mutual maintains its steady advance, the Equitable moves ahead with rapid strides, the New York follows close behind. Our figures show that the Mutual has issued the largest number of policies, that the Equitable policies of the largest average amount, so that the total amount of new insurance is about \$7,000,000 greater. —New York Sun.

MUSICAL AND DRAMATIC.

"William Tell" by the German Troupe. Rosini's opera of William Tell, based upon Schiller's magnificent drama, is the most perfect work of the composer, and the one that will probably be the longest held in remembrance. It is full of beautiful music perfectly expressive of the theme, but it labors under the disadvantage of having a large number of characters of the first importance, and of having several scenes which require elaborate setting if they are to be given with adequate effect. For these reasons William Tell is seldom, if ever, rendered in a style at all appropriate to its merits, and the grand scene at the close of the second act, especially, where the patriotic inhabitants of the different cantons assemble for the purpose of organizing for the liberation of their country, is almost always badly botched, as it was last night. The performance last night was quite up to the average of what we are accustomed to, however, and the leading parts were generally sustained in a creditable style, while the choruses, which in this opera are exceedingly beautiful, were well given.
