FROM WASHINGTON.

Another Victim of the Summer Imbrigo. Special Despatch to the Evening Telegraph. WASHINGTON, March 11.—It has come to the knowledge of Senator Sumner that some time ago the British Minister Sir Edward Thornton, complained to Secretary Fish that while Sumner remained at the head of the Committee on Foreign Relations the British Government was not disposed to enter upon negotiations for the settlement of the Alabama claims.

It is understood that this is what Mr. Morton referred to yesterday when he denied that San Domingo had anything to do with the removal of Mr. Sumner, and that there were other questions connected with foreign affairs which made it necessary. It is now believed that Sumner's position on the Alabama claims was the main cause of his removal.

The question of adjustment will not be determined until it is ascertained whether the Ku-Klux bill can be passed. Mr. Sumner was in the caucus and stated he wanted a bill passed to enforce the rights of the colored people in the cars and other public conveniences.

Terrible Affair in South Carolina—Revenue Officer Killed. Despatch to the Associated Press. WASHINGTON, March 11.—Collector Wallace, of the Fifth South Carolina district, reports that Deputy United States Marshal, William Lopez, was attempting to seize an illicit distillery in the possession of a dealer named Zachariah Young, was attacked by the latter. Both men were shot and killed simultaneously and both were killed at the first fire.

The English High Commissioners called at the Treasury Department to-day, and escorted by Secretary Boutwell and Secretary Skinner, visited the different bureaus of the department.

FROM NEW YORK. The Erie Troubles. NEW YORK, March 11.—The United States Court, Judge Blatchford, this morning, the motion of Health & Raphael that the injunction which had been granted in the State courts for the appointment of a receiver of six millions of Erie stock left with the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company was vacated, judgment being taken by default.

Losses at the Murray Street Fire. The losses by the Murray street fire this morning were as follows:—Lawson & Co., \$50,000, insured for \$50,000; W. H. Rogers, paper maker, \$20,000, insured for \$10,000; Howland & Howland, \$15,000, insured for \$20,000. Losses on the building \$20,000, insurance not ascertained.

FROM NEW ENGLAND. Fire in Rhode Island. PROVIDENCE, March 11.—James Legg & Co.'s wooden mill, at Johnston, Burdetteville, having eight sets of machinery, was burned last night. Loss \$10,000, insured.

FROM THE STATE. A Miner Killed. POTTSVILLE, March 11.—A man named Marrisey, superintendent of John Wadlinger's mines, at Hockscherville, near Minersville, was killed this morning, his head being caught between the roof of the slope and the mine car, while coming out.

JEFFERSON COLLEGE. Annual Meeting of the Alumni Association. The annual meeting of the Alumni Association of the Jefferson Medical College was held in the main lecture room of the college building to-day at 12 o'clock.

Professor B. Howard Rand, Chairman of the Executive Committee, submitted the following report:—Immediately after the organization of the committee a sub-committee was appointed, consisting of Drs. Rand, Hewson, Dungsion, Godell, W. H. Hancock, with Drs. Mears and Hatfield ex-officio members. This committee has held numerous meetings, and the following work has been accomplished:—A list of over 1500 names and addresses of Alumni has been prepared, and a circular setting forth the objects of the association has been sent to each address. A diploma plate has been prepared and is herewith submitted for the inspection of the association.

Vice-Presidents of the association, among which we find the following distinguished physicians mentioned:—J. Marion Sims, of New York; A. Seney, Pennsylvania; W. T. Atkins, Canada; A. K. Smith, U. S. Treasurer Professor B. Howard Rand, M. D. There was also a long list of the graduates of the college, hailing from every State of the Union, elected members of the Alumni. Adjourned.
