METUS SUMMARY.

City Affairs.

-Thomas W. Price was before the Select Council investigating committee yesterday, in relation to a charge of bribery preferred by the Reening Bulletin against a member of the Public Buildings Commission. Mr. Price reiterated the charges, but refused to give the name of his informant.

-The funeral of Judge Lewis took place yesterday afternoon from his late residence, No. 302 South Fortieth street. -Dr. Bashrod W. James had a crowded au-

dience at his lecture last evening.

Domestie Affairs.

-A committee of the Massachusetts Legislature is investigating charges of corruption against the State constabulary.

-The members of the House of Representatives, at Washington, are generally very anxious for an early adjournment.

-The San Domingo Commissioners expect to arrive at Washington to-night by rail from Savannah, where they landed from the steamer Tennessee

-The Indians in Nebraska are committing various depredations. On Tuesday they set the prairie on fire, about twenty miles south of North Platte, and drove the settlers from their homes.

-The District Court of Wyoming Territory met at Cheyenne yesterday, and four ladies were among the jury. A Sioux Indian, who had murdered two men last October, near Fort Laramie, was found guilty and sentenced to be hung.

-The Senate of Virginia yesterday finished the long railroad war in the Legislature by passing the House bill for the sale of the S ate's interest in the Richmond and Petersburg Railroad for a half million dollars, to several gentlemen of Richmond.

-The coal investigation still continues at Harrisburg. A large number of iron and railroad men are present to testify to the great damage the coal strikes are to them. John Siney, president of the Miners' Association, was called yesterday afternoon, and testified at great length in behalf of the miners. The investigation will be closed in a day or two.

-Governor Holden, of North Carolina, was yesterday convicted on six of the articles of impeachment by a mixed vote, some Demoerats voting for acquittal and some Republicans for conviction. The sentence of the court is that he be deposed from office and forever hereafter be disqualified from holding any place of office, emolument, or trust.



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
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
