Illegal Fees-Action of the Bar-Report of the Committee of the Law Association.

The committee appointed by the Law Association upon the subject of the illegal fees charged by public officers in the county of Phicadelphia, and to consider the most effectual means of reducing the charges to those stated in the fee bills, beg leave

charges to those stated in the fee bills, beg leave to report—
That they have had several meetings, at which the matter submitted to them has been discussed, but that owing to the various engagements of the members of the committee, they have not been able to complete the duties of their appointment, and respectfully ask that they may be continued until the next meeting of the association, when they will be able to present in full their plans for the

until the next meeting of the association, when they will be able to present in full their plans for the suppression of the extortions practised by the officers of the law upon litigants.

Your committee beg leave, however, now, to submit some of the measures which they have agreed to recommend, and which, if adopted and carried out, as the committee trust and believe they may be, will be, they think, efficacious in speedily reducing the fees from irregular and extortionate charges to the fixed legal fees established by the acts of Assembly on the subject, and which your committee believe are more than compensatory and remunerative to the officers.

Your committee find upon examination that, except in one or two of the offices, there is an increase

cept in one or two of the offices, there is an increase in the illegal fees and extortion after each election as each new incumbent assumes his office; and as each new incumbent assumes his office; and that however outrageous may have been the illegal gains of his predecessor, the new officer is not coutent until he has either increased upon the existing charges, or made and created new ones even more illegal and extortionate; indeed, the fee bills are utterly ignored, and if the various acts of Assembly had been repealed they would not more effectually have been banished from mind and memory. This is particularly the case in the offices of the Sheriff and Register of Wills, and it is therefore to these two officers that your committee will direct their

two officers that your committee will direct their attention first.

In the case of Jackson vs. Pardue, 3 Penn'a R.. 522, the Supreme Court ruled that "the Legislature have shown great anxiety to restrain officers from charging or taking illegal fees;" and that the officer is prohibited from "taking greater or other fees than those expressed or limited; from charging, demanding, and taking any fee when the business for which the charge is made has not been actually performed; and from charging or demanding a fee for services unless the services are expressly provided for by the act." The court add, "The object of the act was to shield debtors from oppression, and particularly to two officers that your committee will direct their act." The court add, "The object of the act was to shield debtors from oppression, and particularly to guard against compensatory fees. The pensity is given to the party injured; and whether the charge is made ignorantly, or oppressively, and fraudulently, is immaterial." In that case the lilegal fee was paid upon an execution, but the court held that the officer who issued the execution, with his costs endorsed, was liable.

endorsed, was liable.
Your committee beg leave then to present the following measures for your immediate action:

1. That a solicitor be chosen by the association at once for the purpose of prosecuting actions to recover and enforce the penalties prescribed for taking and charging illegal feel, in all cases which may be brought to his notice.
Your committee will say in this connection that

Your committee will say in this connection that the name of John J. Ridgway, Esq., has been submitted to them to fill the position of solicitor, but they leave action upon this nomination to the association, recommending, however, his appointment.

2. That the solicitor be directed to notify the Sherist to comply with the eleventh section of the act of February 28, 1835, which requires him to place and keep up in some conspicuous part of his office the seventy-ninth seeding of the act entitled. It was the intention of your committee to have prepared and submitted such an analysis or table at this meeting, but they have only been able to prepare and present a table showing the fees of the Register of Wills.

4. That a pledge be presented to the members of the bar in the following words, and their signatures obtained thereto:—

the bar in the following words, and their signatures obtained thereto:

"We the undersigned members of the bar of Philadelphiz, do hereby pledge ourselves to each other and the Law Association of Philadelphia,

"First. That we will pay no lilegal fees or costs to any public officer, clerks of the courts, or prothonoraries or their deputies, without receiving a memorandom or bill of particulars, showing the amount of such costs paid and the services rendered, and a receipt therefor.

"Second That we will send all such memorands or

or such costs paid and the services rendered, and a receipt therefor.

"Second. That we will send all such memorands or bills of particulars and receipts to the office of the solicitor of; the Law Association for his inspection, and that we will report any illegal charges and fees made taken by the various public officers.

"That we will each contribute annually the sum of one dollar, to deray the expenses of prosecutions against officers and the sainry of solicitor.

5. That every citizen of Philadelphia be requested to further the ends of the association by taking and requiring; a receipt for all fees and costs paid by him to any public officer, and shall send said receipt, with his name and residence, to the solicitor, who shall thereupon take action upon the same, without cost, charge, or trouble to the citizen furnishing the same, or requiring his attendance at Court, as the receipts, with the record of the particular case, will be all the evidence necessary to recover.

Your committee beg leave to submit an act which they have prepared, and which they would recom-mend should at once be forwarded to Harrisburg in

mend should at once be forwarded to Harrisburg in such a manner as will secure its immediate passage, and by which many of the embarrassing technicalities which tend to defeat the prosecution of actions to recover penalties will be removed.

Your committee would also recommend that a committee of at least five should be appointed to cooperate with the solicitor of the association in his prosecutions, by advising and coanseiling with him upon such points as he may desire; and that this committee shall be appointed semi annually.

In conclusion, the committee beg leave to say that since their appointment they have been called upon by many citizens who take an active interest in the objects for which this committee has been ap-

objects for which this committee has been ap-pointed, and who are warmest in their desires for In the offices of the Register of Wills and of the Recorder of Deeds many of the filegal fees are taken directly from the citizens themselves, and not from the hands of attorneys, letters of administration being frequently taken by parties themselves who are charged eleven and twelve dollars for services which are fixed at two dollars and twenty-five cents, and we recommend that the attention to the contract of cents, and we recommend that the attention of the solicitor be at once directed to this office, and that prompt and effective measures be taken to reduce

An act relating to the mode of procedure in certain

An act relating to the mode of procedure in certain actions.

Section 1. That in all actions instituted in any court, or pending an appeal from aldermen or justices of the peace, brought to recover lilegal fees, or the penalty provided by law fer receiving illegal fees, the plaintiff may enter judgment for the amount claimed on or at any time after the third Saturday after the return day, unless the defendant, his clerk, or deputy, as hereinafter provided, shall have filed a sufficient affidavit of defense stating the nature and character of the same; provided that the plaintiff shall have filed same: provided that the plaintif shall have filed within two weeks after the return day a statement specifying the fees charged to be lilegal, tue date of payment, and the name of the officer, clerk, or deputy who received the same; and in all cases the affidavit of defense shall not be considered sufficient unless made by the officer, clerk, or deputy alleged to have received the same. And the Courts of Common Pleas shall have original concurrent jurisdic-tion of all such actions.
