FROM WASHINGTON. [BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.] Small-pox on a Government Vessel. WASHINGTON, April 12.—A despatch received at the Navy Department to-day from Commander Breece, of the Plymouth, dated Brest, France, March 21, announces that, being en route to Havre from Bordeaux, several cases of varioloid made their appearance on the ship, and by the advice of the surgeon he proceeded to land them and take such steps as might be necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

The Texas Pacific Railroad. The New York, April 17.—At a meeting of the stockholders of the Texas Pacific Railroad Company, for the purpose of electing directors, Marshall A. Roberts occupied the chair. A resolution was adopted postponing the election for directors until a meeting shall be called by the President, after fifteen days' notice given in papers in New Orleans, Washington, Memphis, Philadelphia, and New York; also, a notification by mail to each stockholder. The treasurer was ordered to invest \$300,000 in Government bonds, or make a deposit with interest with the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company. Before the meeting closed the treasurer issued receipts for ten per cent. premiums paid on subscribed stock.

Murder Near St. Louis. St. Louis, April 17.—The body of a murdered man was found in a shallow grave partially covered with large stones near the quarantine hospital, thirteen miles below the city, on Saturday. Papers were found on the body addressed to Captain Charles H. West, of Company E, 6th Mississippi Infantry, and signed by George T. Balch. Other documents were found referring to Mr. West as captain of the 58th Colored Infantry. One of these was from the quartermaster's department at Washington, stating that his property returns had been found correct and that his resignation had been accepted. This was dated in 1864. The skull of the deceased was badly fractured. There is no clue to the murderer.

City Affairs. —The Councils Finance Committee last night had under consideration the bill appropriating \$300,000 for new station-houses, but the matter was postponed. —Messrs. Gardner & Fleming have secured the contract for building 22 fire carts at \$600 each. —William Saunders, colored, has been committed to answer for burglary at the house of Daniel Fisher, No. 724 Wallace street. —The misunderstanding between Mr. Wanamaker and the tailors has been amicably adjusted. —The thermometer yesterday marked 58 degrees at 3 P. M. —The Board of Trade met yesterday, but transacted no business of special importance. —The Bethany congregation at Twenty-second and Bainbridge streets are collecting money for the erection of a new church. —A supervisor who was paying Carter's alley with ashes, on Saturday last, was stopped by the Citizens' Association. But the fellow was at his old tricks again yesterday. Foreign Affairs. —Martin Carrera, ex-President of Mexico, is dead. —The Commune has instituted a general court-martial. —The trials of the Communist leaders are now proceeding. —More defeats of Cuban insurgents continue to be announced. —The war on the priests and the churches is continued by the Reds. —Nearly every one who can get away from Paris is making efforts to that end. —Barriades continue to be erected at many different points in and around Paris. —The elections to fill vacancies in the Commune Council attract little attention. —General Sanchez Ochoa has been appointed minister from Mexico to the United States. —The Prussians are massing large reinforcements to their troops in the vicinity of Paris. —The Emperor and Empress of Brazil will leave Rio Janeiro next month on a visit to Europe. —Representatives of foreign countries are jointly urging the Commune to accept a truce. —In Paris provisions are growing scarce, and should the city be again besieged it will have to sustain starvation. —A demonstration in favor of the insurgent French was attempted in Hyde Park, London, on Sunday, but it proved to be a failure. —The Paris insurgents are under the strictest discipline, and in the late engagements succeeded in taking several thousand prisoners. —All the Australian colonies are fortifying their ports, as rumors have reached them that a descent is to be made by American filibusters. —In the engagements before Paris, during the past few days, the loss to both contestants has been great, but as yet no reliable figures are given. —The Pontifical Zouaves were engaged in close quarters at Nentilly, on Sunday, but were defeated with the loss of colors.

—The London Times of yesterday, in its leading article, says that the case of the Alabama has always created a feeling of insecurity in England and has demoralized American politics, adding that arbitration will acquit England of the responsibility of the Alabama claims.

Domestic Affairs.

—Vice-President Colfax and family left Washington yesterday for their home in the West. —George Apple, one of the most notorious outlaws of Robeson county, N. C., was killed on Sunday by a party of citizens. —A Cleveland despatch says there is a strong feeling among the Republicans there to nominate Hon. Ben. Wade for Governor of Ohio. —The Nebraska State Lunatic Asylum, at Lincoln, has just been burned, and two of its inmates are supposed to have perished in the flames. —General Spinner has now nearly recovered from his recent severe illness, and will go to Europe on business connected with the new loan.
