-The Austrian Reichsrath has, by the adoption of a resolution, demanded of the Government the introduction of the promised bill in relation to Church and State.

-It is rumored that the Versailles Government has paid the first instalment of the war indemnity to Prussia, and that the latter is relinquishing some of the French forts.

-An armistice was concluded on Saturday for the burial of the dead and to allow the inhabitants of Neuilly, Clichy, and other towns under bembardment to remove to places of safety.
