FROM NEW YORK. (BY ASSOCIATED PRESS.) Exclusively to The Evening Telegraph. Shipments of Spectre. New York, April 27.—The Hansa did take a half million gold double eagle for Europe to-day.

Fictitious Bounty Claims. Frederick Smith, formerly captain of the 104th Regiment New York Volunteers, who was arrested four days ago, charged with defrauding the Government by means of fictitious bounty claims, turned State's evidence, and on his statement some twelve other persons have been arrested. About six thousand fraudulent claims have been discovered, involving over a million dollars. Henry M. Karfels, one of the arrested parties, was examined to-day before Commissioner Davenport, and committed in default of \$10,000 bail.

Serious Affray. John Foster has been arrested, charged with striking Avery D. Putnam, a merchant, such a blow on the head with a car hook in a Broadway car last night that death is probable. John Cunningham, driver of the car, was arrested for alleged collusion with Foster.

Indian Supplies. The bids for supplying a very large quantity of clothing, dry goods, and hardware for the use of the Indians were opened to-day by General Parker, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, in presence of Colonel Cox and J. H. Delano, representing the Secretary of the Interior, and of the Indian Peace Commission. One hundred bidders were present. There were several bids from Philadelphia, St. Louis, Cleveland, and Quakertown, besides a large number from New York. The purchasing Committee will meet to-morrow and the day after, if necessary, to examine the samples and make the awards.
