It would be much better to accept a \$2.70 basis without a sliding scale downward, or the \$3 basis with a sliding scale, on the 1570 pian, down to \$2.50, and the latter we are in favor of and have been all the time.

Coal will again go cown below the basis, and for that reason we advise a sliding scale to \$2.50 to provide against the necessity of a suspension when it does fall below, and for the reason that we believe it will fall to \$2.50 we oppose the present proposition because we know that the operators will suspend their collicrits when it does go down, and a first having pocketed the advance above the basis themselves they will leave the men in the lurch." The proposition we made on April 22 des not admit of any such construction as put upon it in the shove article and we charge the author of it with fa'sely and maticiously attempting to mislead you to

We now again assert that we made this offer in good faith, and with the firm intention, if it is accepted by you, to continue to work "throughout the year" regardless of the price of coal in the market and subject only to unavoinable causes, such as breakdowns at collieries and want of means of transportation.

This we confidently believe we can do, and the editor of the Monitor has no right to charge us with "consummate trickery and deception" in this offer until we have had a fair trial.

At 3 o'clock Associate Justice Clifford. said that in the cases of Knoz against Lee, and Parker against Davis-one from Texas and the other from Massachusetts-the questions had been discussed in this court-first, is the act of Corgress known as the Legal-tender act constitutional as to contracts made before its passage;

The court now affirm these questions, the Chief Justice and Associate Justices Nelson, Clifford, and Field dissenting from the majority of the court, both as to their premises and conclusions. Judge Swayne delivered the opinion of the court in the case of Bondinot against the United States, affirming the constitutionality of the internal revenue law extending over Indian Territory as to the tax on spirits and tobacco. Justices Bradley and Davis dissented. Justice Field
