A comparison of her displacement with her internal capacity indicates that as regards safety no more capable vessel of the navy in this respect could have been selected for the service in which she was engaged, and none that would have afforded the same space for comfort without intruding upon the quarters of the offi-

cers and crew. The surface of the principal sails was augmented nearly one-third. This increase has added much to her efficiency under cauvas, and given her power to act with safety in all weathers. Her equipment in all departments

was full and complete for all purposes. The report goes on to show that the yessel was amply furnished with all the appliances necessary to extinguish fires, having thirty-one delivering nozzies and 1150 feet of hose, and to free the bilges she had six blige-pumps besides. These were worked by steam.

The board finally determined that the Tennossee evinced no signs of unseaworthiness and proved in all respects as staunch and perfectly safe a vessel for the duty assigned her as ever floated, and that she was also better adapted for this service than any other vessel in the navy. The report is signed by all the members of the board.
