SUMMARY OF CHURCH NEWS.

EPISCOPAL,

-Bishop Lee, of Iowa, has felt compelled, by the canons of his Church, technically to "dispose" Rev. Dr. Cooper from the Episcopal ministry, carefully stating, however, that it was simply because of his voluntary withdrawal, and "not for causes affecting moral character.

-Dr. William Davidson, of Hamilton, Ohio, has been compelled to desist from ministerial labors for a time, on account of failure of health.

-The closing exercises of the Newberg Theological Seminary were held on the 18th and 19th of last month, in the presence of Board of Superintendents. Nine the students have been in attendance during the session.

-Dr. Beveridge, Professor of Theology in the Seminary at Xenia, has resigned his chair on account of the infirmities of age. He has been connected with the Seminary for thirtysix years.

-Mr. J.Owen Dorsey, a candidate for Holy Orders in the Diocese of Maryland, was ordained on Sunday, April 2, by Bishop Johns, and will soon leave for the Diocese of Nebraska, to take charge of a new work among the Ponka tribe of Indians.



-The following letter written to the First Baptist Church, Philadelphia, by their pastor, -The New although dated Mount Sinai, February 21, 1871, was mailed from Jerusalem thirty days later:-

Ever Dear Brethren:-Since writing you from Rome, mine eyes have gazed on many a memorable spot. I have crossed the blue Mediterranean, the scene of Jonah's recreancy and Paul's shipwreck. I have sojourned in the land of Egypt-the land of the mysterious and sacred Nile; the land of the mighty was mide and ship yas and tamber the land mysterious and sacred Nile; the land of the mighty pyramids and sphinxes and temples; the land made memorable by the footsteps of Abraham and Jacob and Joseph, and the millions of the oppressed chil-dren of the covenant, and Moses; the land made dear to Christ's Church by the presence of Clement and Oatharine and Grigen and Athanasius and Augustine. I have crossed from Africa to Asia, the continent which gave me birth. I too have crossed the Red Sea, not indeed under guidance of pillar and cloud and fire, but under guidance of Him who is evermore working the guardianship of Him who is evermore working the unnoted miracles of daily food and shelter, and friends and redemption. I have encamped at Elim, where were "tweive wells of water, and three score and ten paim trees." I have traversed the dreary Wildernessgof Sin, where the children of Israe, almost frenzied with thirst and hunger, cried to Moses and Aaron, "Would to God we had died by the hand of Jehovah in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fiesh pots, where we did eat bread to the full; for ye have brought us forth into this Wilder-ness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." I have encamped in the Valley of Rephidim, where Israel, under the cheftsined on one of the outhaug-ing chifts, he litted up his great heart in prayer. And now to-night I am encamped before awful Sinai friends and redemption. I have encamped at Elim, now to-night I am encamped before awful Sinal itself; even now mine eyes gaze on the sacred Mount, on which rested the Glory Cloud, from which proceeded the voice of the trumpet waxing exceeding loud; the mountain which heaved and quaked "because Jehovah descended on it in fire." I have scaled the august height itself, and stood trembling in the rift traditionally believed to be the "cleft of the reck" where Moses saw the glory of Jehovah

The rock" where Moses saw the glory of Jehovah sweeping by. Oh, brethren, even amidst the bright anticipations of past years, I had hardly dared to hope that mine cyes would ever gaze on this majestic acens. But tarough the tenderness of our God and your own generosity, I am here in the wilderness of the wan-dering, with my tent pitched at the very foot of the awful height. Yet even amidst this scene of terrific majesty, I hear the still, small voice which speaks even louder than Sinas's whiriwind and earttquake; it is the still, small voice of Himj with whom on an-other height, which I hope ere long to beheld, israel's Lawgiver and Prophet conversed concerning his approaching exodus. Heaven grant that the law may indeed be my school-master to lead me unto and keep me with Christ. For "this Mount Sinal in Arabia answereth to Jerusalem which now is, and is in bondage with her children; bat Jerusalem whick is above is free, which is the mainer of us all." God for Christ's sake grant, dear pretheen, that all of us may be like Isnae, children of pro-mise! mise! Amidst my wandarings, my heart fondly turns to

Amidst my wanderings, my near i fondly turns to you all. Specially do my petitions daily and almost hourly arise for the bereaved and sick and poor and aged and afflicted. I trust you have had a profitable fast-day. I long to hear from you. May food give me grace to walk in and out before you more tuon-bly and faithfully.
