

NEWS SUMMARY.

CITY AFFAIRS.
—The brigade drills of the militia yesterday were a success. General Meade was a spectator of the evolutions of the soldiers.

—The subject of correcting the names of our streets has been referred to a sub-committee of the Council Committee on Law and Surveys. The Committee on Law has agreed to report in favor of releasing certain judgments which were obtained against Mr. Moore for running a line of omnibuses on Broad street.

—The Athletics beat the Rising Star Club yesterday by a score of 35 to 1. The Athletics go today to New York to play the Eckford and to-morrow the Athletics.

—The membership of the Pennsylvania Reserves numbers 108. At the anniversary celebration delegates from Pittsburgh and a number of other towns will be present.

—The thermometer was yesterday, at 3 P. M., 62 degrees.

Domestic Affairs.
—General Butler addressed the colored people of Boston last evening on political subjects.

—The break in the Erie Canal, near Rochester, N. Y., is nearly filled up, and water will be let in to-day.

—The President has about forty nominations to send in to the forthcoming executive session of the Senate.

—Mine after mine in the coal regions continues to resume work upon the operators' terms, and the laborers of the striking miners are ever-anxious to take their places.

—Large delegations of rough characters will start for Buffalo and Erie, Pa., to-day, to proceed from there to the scene of the brutal prize fight between Coburn and Mace.

Foreign Affairs.

—The column in the Place Vendôme has not yet been removed.

—The canonade before Paris yesterday was quite vigorous.

—General Dumont has been appointed commander of Fort d'Issy.

—The Imperialists are said to be very active in the rural districts of France.

—The final treaty of peace between France and Germany was signed yesterday at Frankfurt.

—Bismarck is inclined to give up the forts before Paris, but insists upon the strict payment of the war indemnity.

—Steps have been taken by the Versailles Government to prevent the assembling of the projected Peace Congress at Bordeaux.
