REVIEW OF NEW BOOKS

-"John Woolman's Journal" is a work that many persons have heard of and that but few have read. One of the pioneers of the anti-slavery movement in this country, the great result for which, he an humble workingman, earnestly labored in the face of an opposition that appeared all powerful, has been accomplished, and the day has now come when the rare beauty of his writings can be apprated by those who ten brief years ar , ould have turned from them in disgust As a record of the anti-slavery movement of the last century and of the earnest protests made by the Society of Friends against the system of human bondage both before and after the revolution, this Journal has a positive historical value, but it will be even more appreciated by the majority of readers on account of the genial and kindly Christian spirit in which it is written, for in no work of the kind with which we are acquainted has the writer more thoroughly revealed himself. A FAST LOUISIANA SENATOR.

He Steals \$15,000 of State Funds, and Attempts to Commit Suicide.

From the N. O. Picayune, May 3. The gossipping circles of our city were considera-bly agliated on Tuesday by the announcement that a member of the Louislana State Senate had attempted to commit suicide on Monday by shooting himself in the head with a Derringer pistol, at his rooms in the Second district.

Various conjectures were indulged in as to the immediate cause of the rash attempt, and, although it was generally conceded that the party in question had been living a very fast life, even for a dush Louisiana State legislator, it was not known that he was seriously embarrassed financially. Upon investigating the matter on Wednesday, however, the representative of the Pleagune discovered, upon application to the State Auditor, that the party in question, who holds or held the position of State tax collector for one of the outlying parishes, was a defaulter to the State in the sum of fourteen or nfteen thousand dollars; that the State Auditor had made in affidavit against him for embezzlement, made in allidavit against him for embezzlement, at that a warrant had been already issued for his arrest. We may say just here that when our representative called upon Mr. Graham he had not heard the report of the attempted suicide of the party against whom he was proceeding oriminally. The Senator in question is quite a horse-fancier, and has been in the habit of driving out very handsome and fast the process of many against whom the process of the party against the party again turbouts of his own upon the road, one of which he recently disposed of at a great sacrifice to a crother Senator, thus giving the impression that he was in straitened circumstances. There are a number of suggestive incidents connected with the life of the accused during his residence in our city, which, if given, might afford much food for gossip and scandal; but, as we have only to do with the public acts of individuals, they shall, unless brought out by trial, be withheld from our columns.
