City Affairs.

The committee of the Board of Trade to whom was referred the subject of "tidal booms" to prevent the return of the ice at the "Horseshoe" after it has once passed that point, have reported against the plan as not being practicable. The board passed resolutions of thanks to our Congressmen for securing the passage of the law which allows goods destined for this city to come by way of New York or other cities in bond. Mr. John E. Ewing read a communication on the subject of railroad freight delivery, in which he maintained that the business prosperity of the city would be increased by a proper distribution of the depots, etc.
