Resolutions were adopted demanding the passage of an act calling a State Constitutional Convention, for the purpose, among other things, of abolishing special legislation and securing the election of all State officers by the people; declaring for protection to home industry, and the abolishment of the State tax on personal estate, and endorsing the administrations of Governor Geary and President Grant.


