THE BAPTIST PUBLICATION SOCIETY. Interesting Statistics of the Work Done by the Society from its Organization. From the Chicago Journal, May 19.

The "American Baptist Publication Society" met this morning in Farwell Hall. The attendance was very large, the body of the hall being filled, and several hundred persons occupying

the first gallery.

It appears that this society is composed of the old american and Foreign Bible Society and the Publication Society—a union which is scarcely completed yet. The Publication Society was organized in Washington in 1824, and was for several years known as the Baptist General Tract Society. In 1821, it took the name of the American it took the name of the American Baptist Publication Society. The general object of the organization, as defined by the constitution, is "to promote evangelical religion by means of the Bible, the printing press, colportage, and the Sunday-school." In 1844 its assets were reported at a little over \$4000; in 1871, 2,000. Of this \$75,000 is a permanent invest-t for benevolent work. Last year the society ished 209,921,429 pages. The receipts in all

FROM VESTERDAY'S FIFTH EDITION. | departments last year were \$332,149. It was the first in this country to employ the missionary colporteur. This branch of the work is a most important one, as it reaches the people in their important one, as it reaches the people in their homes with the Bible, tracts, religious papers, and destitute neighborhoods with the preaching of the gospel. During the year there was saued of books, tracts, etc., 3,041,489 copies, equal to 9,921,429 18mo pages. This exceeds the issue, of last year by 5,148,827 pages. The society has printed, of books, tracts, etc., since its organization, 38,413,770 copies, containing matter equal to 1,762,947,241 pages in 18mo. The whole number of publications on the society's catalogue at the of publications on the society's catalogue at the present time is 1082, of which 534 are bound volumes. Three kundred and eight new Sunday-schools have been organized dur-ing the year, and 500 converts have been baptized by colporteurs. At the last annual meeting, held in Philadelphia, the name of the society was changed to that of the "Bible and Publication Society." The receipts in the business department for the year ending March 1, 1871, are \$274,439 99, being \$19,925-09 more than the business receipts of last year. The receipts in the missionary department are \$57,709.60, being \$9574.50 less than the benevolent receipts last year. This decrease is occasioned by the fact that two of the agency districts have been without collecting agents during the last year. The total receipts in both departments are \$332,149 69, being \$10,356 50 more than the total receipts of last year.

DR. BOLLINGER.

Increasing Strength of His Pesitlon—Adherence of the South German Catholics.

The German Correspondent of May 6 says that the movement headed by Dr. Dollinger continues to gain ground in Southern Germany. Professor Friedrich, who belongs to the court by right of his position has made a personal application to the King of Bavaria for permis-

sion to continue his spiritual functions.

The guestion has been referred to the Minister of Public Worship. The students of Munich proposed to arrange a torchlight procession in honor of Dr. Dollinger, but he declined the honor with thanks, as he had never accepted such compliments, and wished no demonstration of the kind to be made at present. It is said that he intends not to lecture at the University during next term, but to resume his courses in the winter. The students of Munich are signing an address approving of his views, which is to be forwarded to the other universities of Germany and Switzerland. It is said that the clergy of the Court have been given to understand that, though no wish is entertained to interfere with their ecclesiantical views or position, they will do well not siastical views or position, they will do well not to join in any public declaration against Dr. Dollinger, in case such a step should be contemplated by the rest of the clergy, as by doing so they would show a want of respect for their superior. Such a step could not be demanded by the Bishop, as, if it were, the declaration would lose its voluntary character. The news that Lord Acton is about to leave for England is unfounded, as he intends to remain with his old

teacher and friend during the present crisis. In the meantime eighty Cataolic parishes have signified their approval of Dr. Pollinger's views. Professor Berchtold has published, in the form of a pamphlet, a commentary on the paper he presented to the Munich faculty of law on the dogma of the infallibility of the Pope. The Bavarian bishops are about to meet at Elchstadt for the purpose of forwarding a common letter to the Pope. Father Hyacinthe has addressed from Rome a letter to Dr. Dollinger, in which he says the time of words is past and that of action come. The letter terminates:-"Courage, great and noble heart! Be blest for having offered yourself spontaneously to the danger for the House of Israel. The strong ones have disappeared from among us, and have gone to rest-cessaverunt fortes in Israel et quieverunt;' but Jehovah has raised you in your old days for new combats and new victories. 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


