#### PHILADELPHIA MERCHANDISE IN BOND.

The New Transportation Law-Remarks of the Special Agent of the Treasury Department.

Yesterday the committee of merchants appointed by Collector Forney to confer with the Treasury Department in reference to the transportation of goods in bond from New York to this city, held a meeting at the office of Mr. Plitt, No. 508 Walnut street. L. P. Thompson occupied the chair and Mr. Buchey

acted as Secretary.
D. G. Lobdell, Special Agent of the Treaury Department, was present, and after stating that the Secretary of the Treasury had consultation with the Collector of New York, in which the latter promises to afford all facilities for the proper execution of the new law, Mr. Lobdell said: -

The importations of dutiable merchandise at New York are well known to be so largely in excess of the conveniences and means for the prompt ap-praisal of the goods and the speedy liquidation or ascertainment of the duties, that there is every reason to believe the immediate transfer of all importa-tions intended for Philadelphia and several other ports, without examination, appraisement, and liqui-dation of duties at New York, will meet with the decided approbation of the importers and customs able and desirable relief to their own local but At all events, I think I can assure you that no fac-tious topposition on the part of customs officials at

New York need be apprehended.

In respect to proper modes of procedure, I again respectfully suggest the importance of importers at ports of destination having a suitable agent at New York to whom the goods can be consigned for immeliate transportation, and to whom the invoices, with he consular certificates attached, can be sent in the

irst instance. By this means much unnecessary ielay can be avoided. I also have to say that a copy of the invoices, deplarations, and certificates must be kept on file at the custom house at ports of first arrival. In cases n which the certificate copy cannot be had for that purpose, such copies will, of course, have to be furnished by the consignee or agent. I find, on examination, that the forms of declarations and certifi-cates are prescribed in the consular regulations of 1870. I have to suggest that the use of printed blank forms of such declarations and certificates can easily be procured, by having them printed, in such manner as to leave space for names and dates o be inserted to form the copies required. The question as to whether the use of internal revenue stamps is required by law on the entry (form A) for transportation, has been plainly and fairly presented for the consideration of the department. An early decision has been requested and may soon

A free interchange of opinions was then had

A telegram was received from the Hon. Leonard Myers, addressed to Colonel John W. Forney, as follows:—"Please say to committee that the Secretary assures me every aid will be given to carry out the law in regard to direct importations, and new regulations will be made for the purpose whenever regulations."

Mr. Huston, Deputy Collector of this port, Adopted:—
Resolved, That Colonel J. W. Forney, Collector of the Port of Philadelphia, be requested to say to the Secretary of the Treasury, that it is practicable, under the law, to have the Collector of Customs at Philadelphia designate one of his sworn officers to be stationed at New York city, to take charge of all entries of merchandise arriving at the port of New York for immediate transportation to the port of Philadelphia, after the entries have been received by him, to have the same checked with the manifest Philadelphia, after the entries have been received by him, to have the same checked with the manifest at the Custom House, and to cause the merchancise to be delivered to the Camden and Amboy Railroad Company for transportation, drayage and fees to be paid by the railroad company; also that the Secre-tary of the Treasury instruct the Collector of the Port of New York to afford said officer all due (aci-Port of New York to afford said other all due faci-lities for the performance of his duties. After passing resolutions of thanks to Colonel Forney, Collector of the Fort, and Mr. D. G. Lobdell, special agent of the Treasury, for the interest they had taken in the matter, the meeting adjourned, subject to the call of the Chairman.

#### MEMORIAL ORGAN.

In the Presbyterian Church, Germantown -The Compass of the Instrument. The Market Square Presbyterian Church of

Germantown last week placed in their building a new organ. The instrument is a memorial in commemoration of the union of the two branches of the Presbyterian Church. It is beautifully unished and is painted in the new style of polychromatic art, and is built of chestnut, with walnut facings, the wood work being finished in oil. The key-boards and stops are in a most compsct form, and we notice several new arrangements for the convenience of the organist. The principal of these is a pedal by the use of which the organist may arrange a combination of stops of the "Great Manuale" without moving his hand from the keyboards. The "Pedale" has a compass adequate to the performance of all music written for the organ, and contains a compass a compass and contains a compass a c and contains pipes of large scale, giving full, deep, and pervading bass of ample power.
